An indication of the severity of last winter, especially among deer and other wild animals has been furnished by a report just made to the department of forestry by John W. Keller, of Boalsburg, in charge of the state forest in Centre county. In the various woods he found sixteen deer, mostly does and fawns, apparently dead for weeks and close to streams which had been frozen to the bottom during the winter. 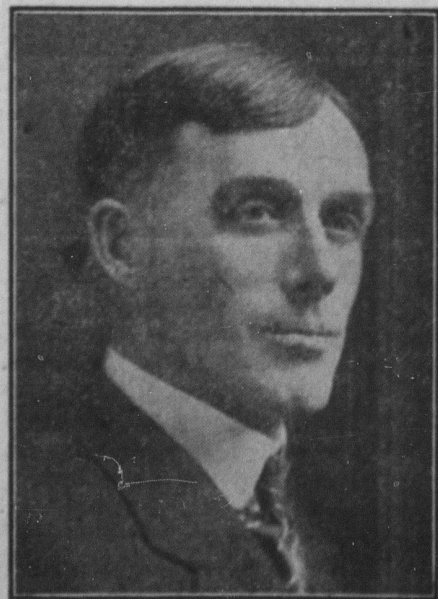
