Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1885.

September 10, 1885.

John C. Smull has been appointed postmaster at Rebersburg.

Passengers and freight traffic are still increasing on our railroad.

Howard Smith, a carpenter, who lives near Union church, was seriously injured on Monday, at Moyer's sawmill, two miles east of here. He was assisting in the erection of a house, when a plank fell and struck him on the head, knocking him senseless. Dr. Alexander was called and rendered medical aid.

Thomas Yearick has been appointed postmaster at Aaronsburg.

A. S. Kerlin has purchased two of the Hoffer lots at the eastern end of town and will at once proceed to erect a house.

The incorporation of Centre Hall as a borough divides Potter township into three voting districts, viz: South precinct, North precinct, and Centre Hall borough.

May Map Forests from Airplane.

Pennsylvania's forests may be mapped from an airplane. Gifford Pinchot, the chief State forester, announced that he had asked for estimates by a commercial aerial concern, and if the cost is not prohibitive the project will be undertaken.

Commissioner Pinchot explained that no map showing the distribution of timberland in this State, private and State-owned, exists. He declared there was need for such a map in order to show the citizens the vast extent of the potential timberlands, and also to impress upon the public the enormous territory of 5,000,000 acres occupied by the "Pennsylvania Desert". This is the territory that has been lumbered and burned-over so often that it is producing virtually nothing of value.

Gillette Wins By Small Margin.

The official count in the four counties of the Twenty-first Congressional district has been completed and indicates that Theodore Davis Boal, of Bualsburg, and Melville Gillette, of Smethport, were elected as delegates to the Republican National Convention.

Items from the Millheim Journal.

Several cars of U. S. government trout were received by local fishermen Tuesday. The young trout, which were of good size, were placed in Elk creek in the Millheim narrows.

A herd of five deer are almost daily seen feeding on one of H. C. Frankenberg's grain fields, north of Smithtown. In the fields of the Harter Bros' farm east of Coburn, adjoining the mountains, as high as seven deer have been seen from the porch of the farm house at the time.

On Wednesday forenoon between 7 and 8 o'clock, while giving a tractor demonstration on the M. E. Stover farm near Coburn, William C. Krader had his left foot badly crushed by getting his foot in the machinery while it was in motion. He was taken to the Bellefonte hospital for treatment.

State Apple Industry to Be Surveyed Soon.

A survey of the apple industry in Pennsylvania upon more comprehensive lines than has ever before been attempted in the state, is being planned by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture and the Pennsylvania State College. At a conference between Secretary Fred Rasmussen of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture and R. D. Anthony, of the horticultural department of Penn State, the preliminary plans for the survey were gone over.

Every phase of the apple industry throughout the state will be carefully gone over and a wealth of data, compiled. This will be published in book form and this publication will serve as a complete handbook on the industry in the Keystone state. The soil conditions of various sections of the state and their relation to apple growing will be thoroughly covered, while the apple will be traced from the time the tree leaves the nursery until the ripened fruit is placed in storage for the winter.

The survey of the apple industry is the second work of this kind that has been undertaken under the direction of Secretary Rasmussen, the first being the tobacco industry. Work upon the tobacco survey is succeeding rapidly. The experts of Pennsylvania State College are closely co-operating in the preparation of these surveys and when completed they will stand as a record of Pennsylvania's agriculture for this period, in addition to containing all the pertinent facts about each branch of the agricultural industry.

2ND MISSION COMES FROM PHILIPPINES

Body Headed by Senate President Quezon Reiterates Demand for Independence.

That the Filipino people are in earnest in their demand for immediate independence is indicated by the coming to the United States of a second Philippine mission to work for independence. Coincident with this announcement the War Department received a cable from Manila stating that the all-Filipino legislature had adopted resolutions reiterating its plea for immediate independence.

The second mission, like the first, is composed of the leading men of the islands and will work in the United States not only for immediate independence, but also to bring about "better understanding, greater confidence and closer economic relations between the United States and the Philippines."

The mission is again headed by Manuel L. Quezon, president of the Philippine Senate, who is well known in America, having been for six years resident commissioner to the United States.

Mr. Quezon and the Hon. Sergio Osmena, Speaker of the Philippine House of Representatives and Vice President of the Council of State, are the leaders of the Nationalista party, which has been in power since 1907.

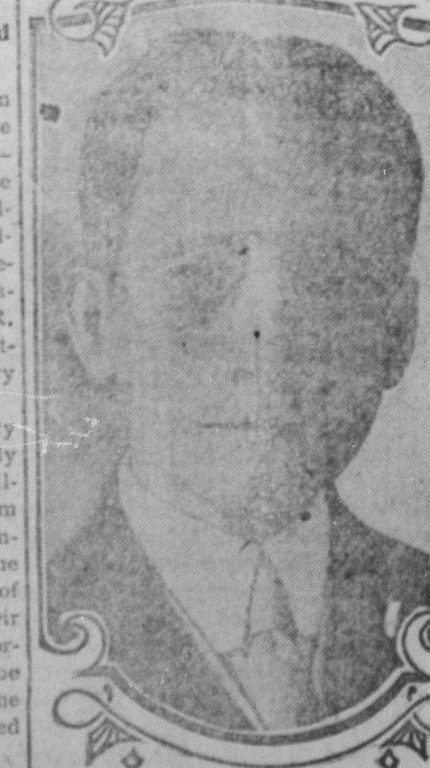
While Speaker Osmena is not so well known in the United States as Quezon, he is considered one of the ablest men in the islands. Senate President Quezon recently referred to Osmena as "the greatest Filipino since Rizal."

The personal relations between Osmena and Quezon are probably without a parallel in modern politics. They have been the leading political figures in the islands for 12 years, yet there has never been the slightest indication of rivalry between them. Throughout their college life as well as their long political service each has refused to be a candidate for any position that the other aspired to.

During the years Quezon was the Philippine delegate in the American Congress he won the esteem and confidence of both the Republican and Democratic sides of the chamber. Whenever he spoke he was assured of a good attendance. One of the official short hand reporters once declared Quezon used the purest English of any member of the House.

Osmena, as president of the Nationalista party, is the leader of the national movement for independence.

"Osmena is the premier 'de facto' of the Philippines," said a leading Filipino

journalist, now in America. "A very conscientious and tireless worker, thorough and persistent, a genius for grasping the big features as well as the smallest details of public affairs, cool headed, quiet by temperament and education, a deep thinker, an eloquent speaker, a polished writer, a keen observer of men—such is Osmena."

Both Osmena and Quezon have been consistent advocates of Philippine independence, yet when the occasion demanded they have never hesitated to champion the cause of America's good intentions toward the Filipino people.

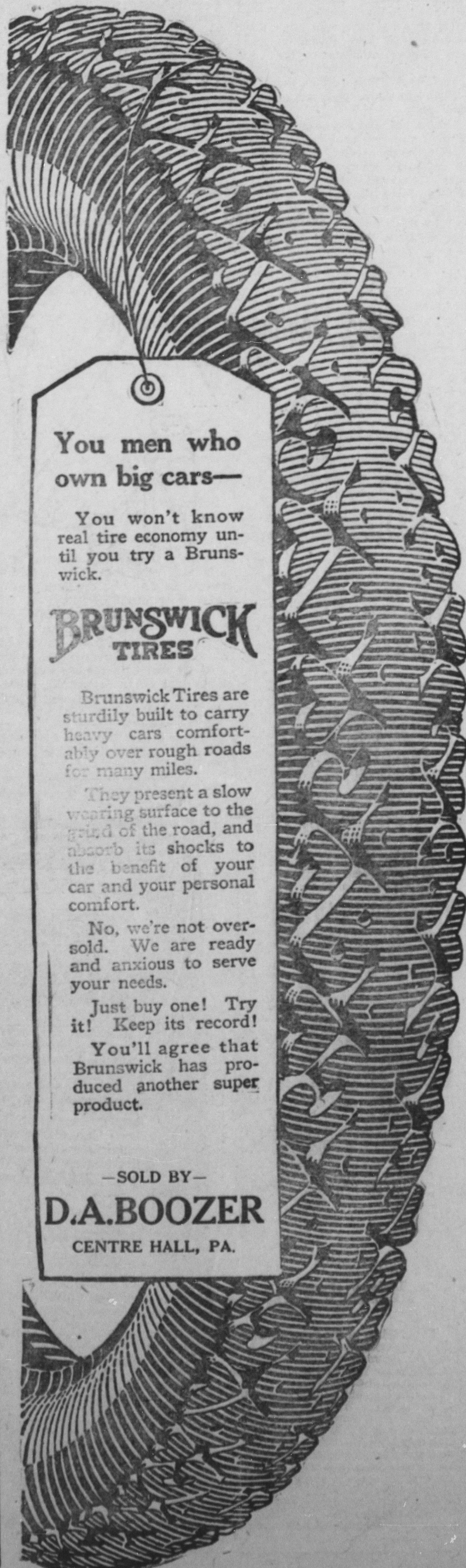

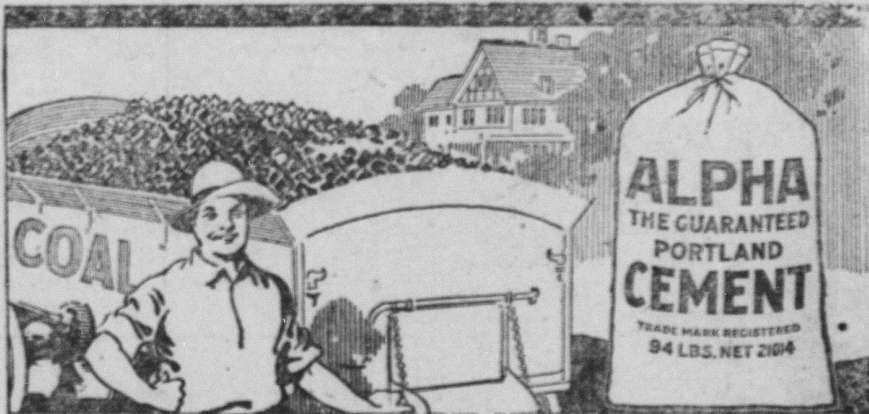
