

THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1885.

September 30, 1885. Charley Boinger intends putting up a shop on Church street this fall. The Locust Grove church festival in Georges valley netted the church clear \$39.00. Col. Jacob Wolf is seriously ill at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Deininger, at Millheim. Ward Rishel, of Milesburg, and son John, of this place, had been very low with typhoid fever. Mr. Kinter, agent at the Centre Hall station, will leave for Riverside station, opposite Danville, in a few weeks. A new schedule for trains will go into effect, October 1st. The new hotel at Penns Cave is being rapidly completed. Mr. Long, the owner of the cave, expects to occupy the building this fall. John S. Emerick has been appointed post master at Wolfs Store. Judge Orvis was taken to Philadelphia a few days ago for treatment of a disease which seems new or rare to physicians. The minute blood vessels near the skin show a coagulation of the blood, causing the appearance of red spots, which change to brown. The Judge has complained of ill health for some time. Mrs. Sarah Harpster, of this place, leaves for the west next Thursday. After visiting friends she will go to Freeport, Ill., where if she likes the place she will make her future home with her son, Wm. Harpster. Carloads upon carloads of potatoes were shipped from Coburn last week, and we are informed that some were purchased as low as 20 cents a bushel. The crop in that section was unusually large. Charles Emerick, of Centre Hall, on Tuesday left for Philadelphia to finish his course in the University of Pennsylvania. This is Charley's fourth term of lectures and therefore when he returns he will be a full fledged "Dr." Two children of Mrs. Jeff. Tresher, of near this place, have been admitted to the soldiers' home at McAllisterville and were taken to that institution last week by Dr. W. A. Jacobs. William Wolf has been appointed postmaster at Centre Hall. The work of the office will not be new to Mr. Wolf, as he held the office quite a long time until removed about twelve years ago. James Price is the new postmaster at Boalsburg. Married, on Sept. 24, at Centre Hall, by Rev. Fischer, Solomon Homan, of Farmers Mills, and Miss Alice J. Wise, of Madisonburg.

Items from the Millheim Journal. Saturday afternoon Harry P. Confer, of Rebersburg, shipped another carload of horses from the Coburn station to Washington, D. C. On Wednesday Dr. G. S. Frank accompanied Mrs. Harry Limbert, of near Rebersburg, to Baltimore, where she will receive treatment for cancer. Harry J. Crouse, who is employed in a bank at Akron, O., on Sunday departed from Aaronburg after spending a week with his father, J. H. Crouse. A vacancy on the Millheim school board, caused by the resignation of Dr. John A. Hardenbergh, who recently went to St. Petersburg, Pa., was filled Monday evening by the appointment of L. W. Stover. Mr. Stover was also elected president of the board. The prospects are very encouraging for raising sufficient money to pay for the oil required for Penn. Main and a portion of North streets. The state highway has kindly consented to apply the oil, providing the streets are properly cleaned and repaired, and the cost of the oil paid by the residents. With but few exceptions the several solicitors for funds were accorded liberal treatment.

Will Grow Trees for Pulp Wood on State Forests. For the benefit of the newspapers of this State the Pennsylvania Department of Forestry has started an investigation into the possibilities of growing trees for pulp-wood on the State Forests. The inquiry was begun because of the acute and increasing shortage of pulp-wood throughout the country. If successful, North Carolina Poplars will be planted extensively to provide a future supply of timber for the manufacture of news print paper. Although two attempts have been made in the State to establish plantations of North Carolina Poplar on a commercial scale, Chief Forester Pinchot believes it can be accomplished with success if proper methods are used. He has instructed John W. Keller, former forester at Boalsburg, and now chief of the Bureau of Silviculture, to make the inquiry. Keller has inspected a plantation of North Carolina Poplars made twenty-two years ago near Tyrone by the West Virginia Pulp and Paper Company. Trees 10 to 12 feet high were planted 10 feet apart on a rocky hillside. The plantation is regarded a failure, as it grew slowly, and was attacked by oyster shell scale and borers. Keller believes, however, that if smaller trees were planted on better soil and closer together, more satisfactory results would be obtained. North Carolina Poplar is one of the fastest growing trees in this climate. It often averages well over an inch in diameter each year, so that in ten or twelve years lumbering could be profitably undertaken. Its texture is admirably adapted to the manufacture of pulp for newspaper uses.

Over Billion Dollars Paid to Service Men. Up to May the Bureau of War Risk Insurance settled a total of 127,151 insurance claims, representing a total value of \$1,132,552,173 45. At the time of this compilation, only 5,119 claims were pending, and in most of these cases the beneficiaries reside in foreign countries where disturbed conditions render communication impossible. Up to the same time, the number of applicants for conversion of War Risk insurance into Government Life policies numbered 133,242, for amounts aggregating more than \$400,000,000. Regardless of how long a service man's insurance has elapsed or been cancelled, and regardless of how long he may have been out of service, a special ruling permits reinstatement at any time up to July 1, this year.
