October 14, 1885.
The frame work of A. S. Kerlin's new home is up.

The Lutherans have selected a lot for a new church at Coburn.

The Centre Hall postoffice was removed on Monday from Reesman's tin shop to Wolf's store.

The carpenters are at work on the steeple of the new Lutheran church; its height will be 92 feet.

When Centre Hall becomes a borough we hope the officers will put the streets in proper condition.

The Centre Hall machine shops are putting in a large new boiler and tearing out the old one, it not being safe.

The bell for the new Lutheran church in this place has arrived, and is from the celebrated Meneely foundry. Its weight is upwards of 700 pounds. The lady members of the congregation have taken up the work of seeing that it is paid for.

Chestnuts, like apples, potatoes and pumpkins are plenty. In some parts of the valley chestnuts sell at 5 cents per quart. Apples are selling at 25 to 35 cents per bushel. Potatoes also at 25 to 35 cents.

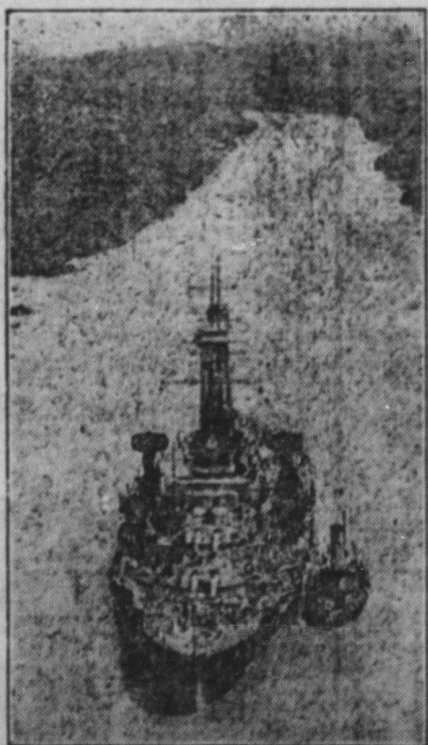
