Farm Calendar.
Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

HESSIAN FLY needs attention at this time. Fields well fitted are apt to be less injured. Do not seed wheat too early.

GARDEN.—Economy demands just enough crop to fill needs. Garden records, showing yield from a given length row, make for real economy of seed and labor.

FARM CROPS.—Start plowing for wheat early. Disk and harrow well to conserve moisture, and have a fine compact bed ready for seeding.

POULTRY.—The flock should be continually examined and the molting hens removed. Any hen at this time of the year that is yellow in the beak and legs and molting will make you more money dead than she ever will alive. Cull your flock closely. Further information on culling may be obtained by writing to the poultry department of the Pennsylvania State College, State College, Pa.

THE SILAGE CUTTER should be examined carefully and arrangements made to put it in good shape before the busy silage cutting season begins. New parts needed should be obtained early to make certain of receiving them on time.

BREEDING.—This is the natural breeding season for cows. Care should be taken that all cows that come in heat be bred. The best practice is to keep the bull separated from the herd.

State Agricultural Notes.
A practical farmer is a business man. The average price of cherries in Pennsylvania this year was 18 cents a quart; raspberries, 25 cents, and blackberries 21 cents.

August is the month to clean up the fence rows and waste places. It will improve the appearance of the farm and destroy breeding places for insects.

Fire blight is causing much damage to apple trees. Make a resolution now and keep it, to prevent as much as possible the spread of this disease next spring by the aphids. The delayed dormant spray containing Black Leaf 40 will kill the aphids and reduce the damage from twig blight.
