ANSWERS TO HEALTH QUESTIONS

Question 1-How may persons be protected against small pox? Answer-By vaccination.

Question 2-What evidence of vagcination of children must teachers have? Answer-A certificate signed by a physician.

Question 3-Upon what authority may a child be excused from vaccina-

Answer-Upon presentation of a certificate, signed by the County Medical Director or some one deputized by him, (in Municipalities by the Medical Representative or the Health Authority) setting forth the fact that the child is physically unfitted for vaccination. Such certificate is good for one year.

The subject of the next lesson is "Sneezes". Coughing and sneezing, especially in street cars, motion picture houses and at public gatherings are often the cause of the spread of disease.






