STORES OF MINERAL DEPOSITS

Vast Quantities of Paint Pigments, Exceedingly Valuable, Discovered in Salton Sea.

Several years ago a number of men took up profitless mineral claims on Mullet island, a tiny volcanic formation protruding above the saline waters of the Salton sea of southern California. Gold and pumice were the minerals they were seeking, and little did they think that the waters which lapped against their rocky shores hid from their view a mineral deposit of another variety and practically incalculable value.

A short time ago the Salton sea developed another of its characteristic temperamental streaks. Its surface level dropped 41/2 feet, leaving Mullet island surrounded by hundreds of acres of soft, slimy mull. Presently the attention of the prospectors was attracted to the mud-flats by a strong odor of sulphurous gas and noises which sounded like the fierce boiling of thousands of teakettles of colossal proportions.

They investigated by providing themselves with long wooden shoes resembling a hybrid ski and snowshoe, and with which they were able to walk about over the slimy mud without becoming bogged. At no great distance from the shore they found, uncovered by receding waters of the sea, numberless boiling hot springs, tiny geysers, and mud volcanoes. From these, John Edwin Hogg writes in Popular Mechanics Magazine, flowed various-colored waters, some bright red, others green, blue and yellow, with all the intermediate shades of the rainbow. Great accumulations of material were soon built up around each of the springs, and samples were soon in the hands of a chemist. Analysis disclosed it to be mineral paint pigments; ocher, carmine, ultramarine, and all the other colors essential in the manufacturing of paints.

The prospectors immediately began the construction of impounding reservolrs to segregate the waters from the springs of individual colors. The boiling water is drained very slowly through these impounding beds, and the cooling causes the paint pigment to be precipitated to the bottom of the

pools After several days of aeration, the water from each spring is diverted into another pool. Then, after drying in the sun for a few hours, hundreds of pounds of pigments are spaded out of each pool. The pigment is first dug out into boxes, trundled onto the island in wheelbarrows, and later sacked for shipment to the paint factories. It comes from the pools practically pure, and requires little or no refining.

A crop of low-grade salt is a profitable by-product of the newly developed pigment industry.

GOT HIS DIAMONDS THROUGH

Device Employed by Smuggler Compictely Fooled the Customs Inspectors on Watch for Him.

So he wrote a letter to the New York collector, signing a fictitious name, in which he gave minute information against himself, describing just where the diamonds were to be found in a secret compartment of his trunk.

BIG FACTORS IN TRAINING COLTS

Future Value and Usefulness Depend Greatly on Management While Young.

FIRST GET HIS ATTENTION

Education of Horse Is Based on Reward and Punishment-Many Animals Made Vicious and Unreliable by Carelessness.

The breaking and training of colts is f prime importance, because their future value and usefulness depend to a great extent on whether or not they are well broken. By a broken colt is meant one that is safe to handle in the stable or on the road-and that will promptly obey the orders of the driver

Memory and habit are the two main factors with which we have to deal in training horses. A horse acts through instinct and habit, and one of its greatest characteristics is uniformity of conduct. What a horse is once trained to do he will nearly always do under like conditions:

Education of Horse.

The first thing in training a horse is to get his attention. The second is to make him understand what is wanted. The education of the horse is based on reward and punishment. The reward, a pat on the neck, etc., should immediately follow the act of obedience. The punishment, to be effective, must immediately follow the act of disobedience.

Few horses are inherently vicious. Many horses are made vicious and uneliable by the carelessness or unnecessary brutality of their trainers. If a horse kicks because the harness hurts him, or shies at something of which he is afraid, punishment is not justifiable. If, however, after being stopped, a horse starts before receiving the command to do so, he should be punished. . Horses are naturally obedient, and when thoroughly trained their conduct is uniformly good.

Best Training of Horse.

A horse should be trained so that he thinks there is no limit to his power to do the things required of him, and believes that he has no power to do that which is against the wishes of his driver. Above all, never ask of a

horse something he is unable to perform and then punish him because it cannot be done. If during the first year of his work a colt is hitched only to loads that he can pull, he will develop into a good work horse, while if he is overloaded a few times he may become balky and worthless.

All horses cannot be treated alike. A high-strung, sensitive horse must be treated gently, the dullard sharply. The same force applied to the sensitive horse that is necessary to make the dullard act would be likely to cause the high-strung horse to rebel. while gentleness would obtain obedi-

To train horses successfully a man needs to exercise great patience, gentleness and firmness. If you are training a horse and lose your temper, you had better put the horse into the stable until the next day, for further work at this time will be worse than useless and may undo the work already done.

KEEPING UP SOIL FERTILITY

Provision Must Be Made for Maintaining Production by Fertilizing and Liming.

A noted agricultural scientist once said that it is the business of every farmer to reduce the fertility of his soil by removing the largest crops of which the soil is capable of producing. but ultimate failure results unless provision is made for restoring and maintaining production by fertilizing and liming the soil until it becomes better rather than worse.

DAMAGE BY POOR SIRE

MOST EFFECTIVE WAY TO CONTROL INSECTS

Fall Plowing Is Easiest and Cheapest Method.

Better to Prevent Outbreak of Pests Than to Stamp Out Infestation Once It Is Established-Bugs Exposed to Sun.

Fall plowing is the most universally effective way of controlling the insect pests that annually cause great losses to the grain farmer. It is much easier and cheaper, says the bureau of entomology. United States department of

agriculture, to prevent an insect outbreak in this manner than it is to stamp out the infestation once it is fully developed. The Hessian fly, so destructive to wheat, is one of the insects that can hardly be eradicated once it is established in the crop. Fall plowing is recommended because it breaks up the soil and destroy's the grubs and pupae of many insects by exposing them to the sun and air.

Farmers' Bulletin 835, prepared by the bureau of entomology, tells how to control the most common and dangerous of the grain farmer's insect enemies. It gives briefly the life histories of the Hessian fly, army worm. cutworms, grasshoppers, white grubs, billbugs, corn-root aphis and wire worms, with authoritative data describing the characteristics of each pest and the best practical remedies for control. The bureau advises the grain farmer to plow in the fall, if possible; to keep a supply of insecticides and a spraying outfit on hand; to watch the crops carefully for an outbreak, and to report all outbreaks to the county farm adviser, or direct to the bureau of entomology, United States department of agriculture.

BALING MACHINE IS USEFUL

Farmer or Rancher Is Advised to Invest in Implement to Take Care of Hay Crop.

Hay as a cash crop has been exceptionally profitable for the past two years. As it is likely to remain so for several years to come, the farmer or rancher with a surplus of hay should find a baling machine a good invest-

FORMATION OF GAS IN SILO

Good Way to Determine Its Presence Is by Lowering Lighted Lantern Into the Pit.

Gas may form in a silo at the time of filling and for a week or so afterwards. This gas is heavier than air and so will settle in the sllo. A good way to determine if there is gas in a silo is to lower a lighted lantern, If it goes out, it will not be safe to go into the silo.

MUCH SOIL FERTILITY LOST

Considerable Amount of Injury Done Farm Lands During Winter Months by Erosion.

Much soil fertility is lost every winter by soil washing or erosion. Put a stop to it by keeping the hilly lands in sod, planting a cover crop. providing underdrainage, filling the gullies with brush, etc.

TIMOTHY HAY IN ROTATIONS

Farmers Find Crop Good Stand-by Where Alfalfa and Clover Fall to Make Good Stands.

Farmers who have begun to find difficulty in getting stands of clover and alfalfa find timothy hay a standby with which to round out their rotations and which assures a grop without demanding much labor.

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
