Prof. James E. Wagner, formerly principal of the Bellefonte Schools, but now of Beaver, Pa., has assumed his duties as assistant director of the bureau of administration in the department of education at Harrisburg, on the appointment of Dr. Thomas E. Finnegan.

The scaffolding surrounding the new Philips hotel, in Philipsburg, which is in the course of construction, has been torn down and the building makes a fine appearance. It is planned to carry on the work during the winter months, the heating system being ready for installation.

Rev. M. C. Drumm, in company with his sister-in-law, Miss Mary Hess, motored to Sunbury on Wednesday afternoon where they will attend the county teachers' institute, something which Rev. It was Jasper Wagner who was on one of his regular trips delivering mail from his Ford car that had the exceedingly thrilling experience, yet escaped unhurt. He approached the crossing without detecting the approaching freight train and had almost cleared the track when the engine struck the rear of the Ford, doing considerable damage to it. Mr. Wagner told friends that the freight engine never looked so big and powerful to him as it did at the instant both he and it wanted to occupy the same spot on the earth.

It was a ceremony which Williamsport has not seen in fifty years and had the unusual distinction of attracting the presence of all but one of the elective officers of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, a greater number than are usually able to attend any local functions.

THE DEATH RECORD.

DAILEY.—Mrs. Elizabeth Dailey, widow of James A. Dailey, passed away at the home of her sister, Mrs. James H. McCool, near Tusseyville, on Monday morning at 7 o'clock, following an illness since September, when she came to make her home with her sister, having formerly resided at Manor Hill, Huntingdon county. A complication of diseases was responsible for her death.

Deceased was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Neece, and was born in Georges Valley sixty-eight years ago. Her husband preceded her to the beyond a year ago in August. Two children survive—Mrs. Carrie Harkison, of Lambertville, New Jersey, and Walter J. Dailey, of Altoona. There also remain four sister and one brother—Mrs. Howard Foust, of Centre Hill, Mrs. James H. McCool, of Tusseyville; Mrs. Ira Obl, of Lamar, and Adam Neece, of Hartleton.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the McCool home, and burial made at Centre Hall.

B-r-r-r, It's Cold.

10 degrees above zero is how the government thermometer read at Centre Hall on Monday morning. Although the winter season did not officially begin until the following day, Monday's weather lacked nothing of being the real thing, with an inch of snow covering the earth, and the zero mark looming up in the near distance.

Tuesday morning went Monday four degrees better toward approaching the zero mark, the thermometer registering 6 degrees during the early morning hours. It was Dec. 21st, and that's winter, so we must expect such low marks.

83 Bucks and 6 Does Killed.

Miner Breaks Neck in Fall.

The body of Mike Evans, a miner employed in the Snow Shoe mines of the Lehigh Coal Company, was found lying in the mud along the main road near Snow Shoe early Thursday morning last, by Robert Kech, who was on his way to work about 6:30 o'clock. He informed the authorities and, in the absence of the coroner, Justice of the Peace George F. Brown, of Clarence, was instructed by District Attorney J. C. Furst, of Bellefonte, to select a coroner's jury and investigate the cause. It was learned that Mr. Evans had changed clothes after leaving the mines the previous evening and gone to Clarence, that he had taken a shortcut while returning to the boarding house of Andrew Basalla at Poorman's siding and was traveling a narrow road and had evidently fallen and rolled down the embankment to the spot where he was found by Mr. Kech.

His neck was broken and there were no indications in the mud to show that he had strangled. His pockets contained money amounting to \$65.76, some oranges, chewing gum and candy, which he presumably was taking to the boarding house for the children. The verdict of the coroner's jury was that death had come an accident in which the deceased had fallen and broke his neck. Evans was aged about sixty years.
