New Theatre For State College.

State College is to have a new and one of the most modern theatres in Pennsylvania in the near future. Maurice Baum has just made the announcement that on or about May 1st he will break ground on the lot on College avenue between the Times office and the First National Bank building for the erection of this most up to the minute play house, which is to be of Adam style exterior, and the interior decorations to be of the same period. It is planned to make the new structure just as near fire proof as modern mechanical skill can produce. The front is to be of tile and the balance of brick, concrete and steel. The plans call for a seating capacity of 1,200 with provisions for enlargement to 2,500 just as soon as conditions warrant it. Steps will be eliminated and incline stairways will lead to the balcony. There are to be no radiators, the system to be installed giving a constant change of air, heated in winter, cooled in summer.
