THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1886.

August 4, 1886.

Will Floray is digging a cellar for a new house near the station.

An excursion to Centre Hall is being talked of by Mifflinburg people.

John Dauberman, of near Centre Hill, thinks of beginning work for a new house in this town, in a few weeks, and will become a citizen of the town after its completion.

On Thursday of last week our baseball team went to Mifflinburg to cross bats with the team at that place. Centre Hall won by a score of 15 to 13.

John Harper, who has been lying in a critical condition for some time, is slowly sinking and is not expected to live long.

The Grangers' annual picnic will be held on the old ground, on the mountain, Thursday, Sept. 16.

The price of building lots at the station is rapidly advancing.

James Lohr has commenced digging a cellar for a new house. This makes three new houses to be built at the lower end of town.—Lohr's, Shoop's and Dauberman's.

George, a little son of Michael Condo, of near this place, met with a painful accident on Tuesday afternoon, in the slaughter house of his father, where some boys playfully pulled him up on the rope used for hoisting beaves; unfortunately the boy's foot slipped from the hook and he slid down, the hook catching him at the lower extremities, tearing one of the members quite seriously.
