Farm Calendar.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

GARDEN—Few families like cabbage heads to weigh over three pounds. Copenhagen, a popular early variety, often gets too large if planted more than fifteen inches apart in the row. Late varieties that are not intended for kraut making can also be grown in a smaller size by close planting.

PRESERVING EGGS—Because of the low price of eggs, one should now consider putting them down for winter use. Lime water or water glass make excellent preservatives. Full directions may be obtained by writing to the Agricultural Experiment Station, State College, Pa.

COOLING MILK AND CREAM—At this time of year farmers and dairymen suffer great losses through not taking sufficient precautions with cooling milk and cream. It can be done with a little additional equipment and labor which will more than pay for themselves. Water coolers are best, or provide space where cans may be set in cold water.

GAS FOR PEACH BORERS—State College entomologists advise that it is not necessary to use paradichlorobenzene as a remedy for peach borers before the middle of August. The method has been proved successful and is recommended as a control measure. It is a very simple and inexpensive process. Your county agent will give information as to procedure.

BUY PURE BREDS—Pure bred livestock is more profitable than scrubs. Why not take advantage of the present depressed condition of the market and add a few head to your herd? It will mean greater financial return in a very short time. Select good individuals as well as good pedigrees.

PLANTING CORN—In less than a month it will be time to plant corn. No use to plant until the soil is fairly warm so that the seed will germinate. If corn lies in a cold wet soil for a week without sprouting it is likely to rot and never produce plants. Take advantage of rainy days to shell and grade seed corn ready for the planter. Remove the irregular butt and tip kernels before shelling. These will not go through the dropping device of the planter with uniformity. Their removal makes possible a more uniform stand of corn.

SUMMER PASTURE—Owing to favorable rainfall and weather this spring, pasture will be earlier than usual. Livestock farmers should take advantage of this fact and move herds and flocks to summer pasture early.

NEW DRILLING MACHINE FOR SALE—

This is a No. 3 friction hoist traction drawn Keystone machine. When I bought it I was in need of a well and could not hire it drilled; then I bought this machine with the intention of drilling a well for myself and then selling it to some other person who might want to drill a well, for what I could get for it or scrap it. But when we came to drilling I had to do some repairing. I then gave it a general overhauling, rehabilitating boxing, bought new belt, 300 feet new rope, a new sand line, some new drill bits, new bearings in engine, etc. When I was done I had a fairly good outfit, and in the spring of 1920 I hired men to start drilling custom work, but this proved a failure, although not the fault of the machine. The difficulties encountered would have occurred with a new machine of any type. However, I have not lost faith in the drilling proposition as I believe there is an opening here for a good profitable business for the right party. Many people have asked me to drill for them and if I were out of a job I would not offer this machine for sale but I would get to operating it myself; but I have more work than I can do so I will sell it for one-fourth the price of a new machine, or for considerable less than what I have in it. If I cannot sell the machine I will let it out to work it on shares, to responsible parties that are capable of taking care of a machine. If I can nei-

ther sell or let the machine I will operate it myself later in the summer. There is a tool wagon and water tank with the outfit.
