OCTOBER 27, 1886.

There are some cases of typhoid fever in Brushvalley.

Bellefonte is experiencing a business boom.

The frame work of Wolf's new house on Church street is going up.

Aaron Harter, of this place, attended the Y. M. C. A. State convention which convened at Altoona last week.

A child of William Ripka, of Gregg township, died of typhoid fever on Sunday.

Workmen are busy putting in the rolls and machinery in the new flouring mill at Oak Hall.

The fever cases in Gregg township are on the decrease and recent patients improving. Low water is thought to have been one of the causes of the disease.

Our townsman, Isaac Smith, will move his family to Williamsport about the 1st of November. He has accepted a position in one of the leading dry goods establishments in that city.

Train Wreck in Mifflin County.

The Kishacoquillas Valley Railroad train due at Reedsville from Bellefonte at 12:02 in the afternoon was wrecked at a point known as Cedar Hill, two miles west of Bellefonte, last Wednesday morning, and three cars of the five-car train were jolted from the tracks.

One freight car, loaded with wheat, rolled over an embankment and one passenger coach was derailed and although the passengers were slightly shaken up, no one was injured. The eight passengers were taken to Reedsville aboard the engine which kept on the rails.

The other derailed car was a freight and when it left the tracks forty cans of cream were spilled, filling the floor bottom of the car with two feet of cream and drowned several score of pigeons that were in a coop.

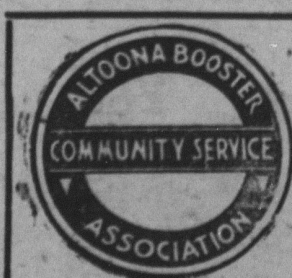

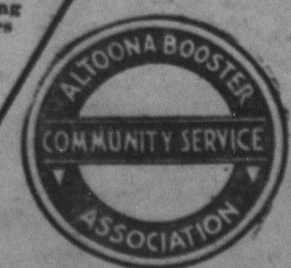
