





A T FIRST glance there would appear to be little connection between the word "grosgrain." applied to heavy silks and ribbons, and "grog," the sailor's slang for drink. But both of them were connected with Admiral Edward Vernon of the British navy, the man who gained fame for the capture of Porto Bello during the war with Spain in 1739 and for whom Mount Vernon, the home of Washington, was named.

To the men of the British navy, however, he owes his greatest fame to the fact that he was the first to order rum and water served to the men of his squadron, beginning this practice on board his own ship. the Burford. Previous to this time, the admiral had acquired the name of "Old Grog," from his habit of strolling along the quarter-deck in a "grogram" cloak - "grogram" being the British sailor's corruption of the term "gros-grain." 
