THIRTY-FOUR YEARS AGO

Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1887.

JUNE 15, 1887.

E. M. Huyett has received a new steam saw mill from Zanesville, Ohio, which he will put in operation on the Potter tract of timber near Linden Hall. Miss Laura Strohm, of Centre Hill who has made quite an extended tour through some of the western states, has returned home.

Ground has been broken for the new Lutheran church at Coburn. It is to be built of brick and will cost from \$3,-500 to \$5,000.

Landlord Meyer, with a party of Berks county triends, drove to Stone Creek on Wednesday and returned in the evening with 120 trout.

Gross Yearick, of Philadelphia, is a visitor in town among relatives.

Charley Meyer caught the boss trout for this town, on Tuesday, at the head of Penns Creek. The fish measured 14 inches.

During the heavy thunder gusts on Thursday afternoon, lightning struck the dwelling of Mrs. Felix Burkholder, near Centre Hill, tearing a parcel of the slate from the roof and setting the house on fire inside, which, however, was quenched before much damage was done.

Philip Auman's barn, about three miles west of Spring Mills, was struck by lightning, on Thursday, slightly shattering the frame work.

Rev. Fischer and Wm. Wolf, delegates to the General Lutheran Synod at Omaha, Neb., after attending the sessions of that body, left on an excursion to Denver.

Six new churches are in view in this valley, namely, a new M. E. church at Spring Mills, for which ground has been broken ; a new church in Haines is in prospect, by either the Lutheran or the Reformed, who have a Union church now ; at Coburn both the Lutheran and Reformed congregations have taken steps to build new churches; at Centre Hall the Presbyterians have selected a site at the south end of town, with fair prospects of going on with building operations. The Reformed congregation of our town also express a desire to erect a new church.
