Little Tot Dies After Eating Tablets Prescribed for Mother.

Luella, 18-month old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James H. Davis, of Philipsburg, died last Thursday morning under peculiarly sad circumstances.

The child, a little toddler just able to get around through the house and eager to clasp everything within reach, got hold of some tablets that had been prescribed for its mother for heart trouble. Unnoticed by the mother the babe ate some of the medicine, and at once be came very ill. Dr. W. R. Heaton was summoned, and all possible was done to save the child's life. Death came about an hour and a half after it had eaten of the tablets.

The fatality has been a sad blow to the parents, and especially to the mother whose health has not been good.

Motor Accidents Are Increasing.

The automobile accident toll continues to climb at an alarming rate despite every possible precaution and the records of Sergeant R. N. Ickes of the state constabulary located at Holliday: burg, just completed for the month of May, shows a total of seventy-three accidents, or better than two a day. One was fatal.

The records show that there were sixty-three accidents between vehicles and ten between vehicles and pedestrians. Injuries suffered by pedestrians in all but the case of the fatal crash, were light. Several resulted from boys running directly into the cars.


