It is incorrect to say: "The wase sets on the table"; say, instead, "The vase rests, or stands, on the table." Do not say, "The flagpole sets firmly in its socket," but say, "The flagpole is set firmly in its socket." If you prefer, you may say, instead, "The flagpole sits firmly in its socket."


