Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1887.

JULY 13, 1887. Friends of Esq. Herring, of Gregg township, are urging him to become a candidate for associate judge.

Mrs. Wolfe, wife of Commissioner John Wolfe, of Miles, is seriously ill of typhoid fever.

James Gilliland, of Oak Hill, has mowed 15 acres of timothy grass this season, which is the fourth successive mowing and a large yield from it.

Wednesday afternoon the thermometer registered 93 degrees in the shade.

A car loaded with grain was thrown from the track on the mill siding at the station, on Tuesday morning, and came within an ace of rolling over the high bank.

John Rishel, of this town, announces himself as a candidate for associate judge.

Prof. Bitner and Chas. Stover, of Spring Mills, went to the Bear Meadows one day this week. They are interested in botanical work and are after specimens of the flora of that locality, which is quite rare and differs from surrounding vegetation.

Mrs. James Boal, of this place, met with a rather painful accident last Thursday. She had gone in the country to visit at the home of Wm. Boal, whose son was quite sick. While approaching the house, her shoe was caught by a splinter in the walk, and tripped her forward. In falling she threw up her hand to save herself and resulted in severely spraining both arms.

The corner stone of the Methodist church at Spring Mills will be laid on Sunday, the 17th, in the afternoon. Rev. D. S. Monroe, D. D., of Bellefonte, is invited.

On Sunday afternoon, 10th, the family of William Boal, of near this place, were called upon to mourn the death of Harry, the only son, aged about seven years and six months.

1800 at Penn State Summer Session.

All records for attendance at the summer session for school teachers at the Pennsylvania State College were broken last week with the enrollment of eighteen hundred men and woman students. This is five hundred more than last year, when a few more than 1300 established a record. The classes this year will be optional for six and nine weeks, and about 600 have signified their intention to remain for the full nine weeks' training. Over two hundred courses are being taught this summer, and the schedule of outside lectures is the most attractive ever arranged.

Agricultural Fair Season Approaches.

The agricultural fair season in Pennsylvania opens early in August and covers the three succeeding months. Fairs and exhibitions are announced to be held in fifty counties this year, beginning with the Kiskiminetas Valley Agricultural and Driving Association, Apollo, Armstrong County, August 3-6, and ending with Venango County Farmers' and Fruit Growers' Association, October 26-28.

In connection with these annual agricultural meetings, Secretary Rasmusen, Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, says: "It is hoped that there will be general competition in all departments of these exhibitions and that the very best livestock and products will be shown in each community. The standardizing of breeds and varieties adaptable to the particular community is to be encouraged rather than to have a diversified number of the same. The Department will assist the officers of the fair association at all times in promoting these exhibitions so as to make them of the most value to the people of the State."

Last year Allentown reported a total attendance of 185,000; "Ye Old York Fair," 166,887, and Reading, 159,247—these are the three largest.

Seventy-one associations last year reported a total attendance of 1,876,985, or an average of 26,436; while for the season of 1919, sixty-eight associations reported an attendance of 1,550,541, or an average attendance of 22,802.

These annual exhibitions are of great educational value to those who go seeking something practical and worth while.
