Agricultural Fair Season Approaches.

The agricultural fair season in Pennsylvania opens early in August and covers the three succeeding months. Fairs and exhibitions are announced to be held in fifty counties this year. beginning with the Kiskiminetas Valley Agricultural and Driving Association, Apollo, Armstrong County, August 3-6, and ending with Venango County Farmers' and Fruit Growers' Association, October 26-28.

In connection with these annual agricultural meetings, Secretary Rasmussen, Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, says: "It is hoped that there will be general competition in all departments of these exhibitions and that the very best livestock and products will be shown in each community. The standardizing of breeds and varieties adaptable to the particular community is to be encouraged rather than to have a diversified number of the same. The Department will assist the officers of the fair association at all times in promoting these exhibitions so as to make them of the most value to the people of the

Last year Allentown reported a total attendance of 185,000; "Ye Old York Fair," 166,887, and Reading, 159,247these are the three largest.

Seventy-one associations last year reported a total attendance of 1,876,985, or an average of 26,436; while for the season of 1919, sixty-eight associations reported an attendance of 1,550,541, or an average attendance of 22,802.
