Famous Hickory Corners Physician Charged With Arson.

Dr. M. L. Emerick, former Hickory Corners physician, and now of Lancaster, was arrested at Elizabethville at an early hour Thursday morning, charged with setting fire to the Silicia paint plant

at Dalmatia, of which he is part owner. His flight from the lower end of town and his sensational capture by armed citizens of small Dauphin county town, furnishes one of the most sensational episodes in the spectacular career of the physician.

What Dr. Emerick's motive was is mystery. The paint plant had been bought in by himself and a man by the name of Huntzinger, of Harrisburg, at sheriff's sale. There was about \$10,000 insurance on it, and the building was possibly worth a few hundred dollars.

While he was waiting with officers at the Dalmatia station Thursday morning , to be taken to Sunbury, the east bound flyer pulled in. As it was leaving, Dr. Emerick leaped aboard and was gone before the surprised party knew what had happened. They telephoned ahead to Millersburg, and there a railroad officer got aboard, and rearrested the physician.

14 Counties Closed On Certain Kinds of Game.

The State Commission has announced a list of 14 counties closed for periods of two and three years on certain kinds of

The counties closed for three years are Bradford on wild turkey, and Susquehanna on deer and ring-neck pheasants. Twelve counties are closed for twoyear periods. They are Bucks, Huntingdon, Schuylkill, Somerset, Tioga, Cameron, Franklin, Lancaster, Lehigh, Lycoming, Pike and Warren. All but Schuylkill and Pike are closed on ring-

neck pheasants. Schuylkill, Bucks and Susquehanna are closed on deer. Bucks is also on quail and grouse. Somerset, Lehigh, Lycoming, Pike and Warren are closed on quail. Tioga, Bradford and Pike are closed on wild turkeys.

Work for East Indian Women.

The thought of Mohammedans fighting for Christian ideals, of dark heathenism taking up arms for the cause of civilization and humanity, opens a vista that would be staggering were it not that the idea has long been dreamed of.

As one result of the war, the women of India bave for the first time worked in the government departments in Delhi, and the question is being debated as to giving women equal representation with men in the plans of the India National society. In all the battle for larger things India has met the problems common to all lands with the most modern, efficient and

self-sacrificing methods. The women of India can henceforth be counted on as a factor in the larger problems of reconstruction.

Exports Increase.

American dairy products are more favorably received in Europe than ever. Exports of condensed milk to Europe rose from 16,000,000 pounds in 1914, to 530,000,000 in 1918, and there were notable increases in the export of other dairy products. Most of this was due to war demands, but there seems an opportunity to expand in dairy exports. A normal increase in dairying in this country is justified providing there is the necessary increase in field crops.
