**Tents in Great Demand for Coming Encampment & Fair.**

Each tent is entitled to two admission tickets and these will be issued at headquarters on Tuesday, Sept. 6th, provided the tent rent is paid on that day and at that time. After that, tent-holders over 18 years of age will be charged admission, 25 cents, and no tickets refunded.


