**THIRTY-FOUR YEARS AGO**

Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1887.

**JULY 27, 1887.**  
John Grove, one of the well known citizens of Gregg, is announced for associate judge.

Henry Beck, a Madisonburg Democrat, has entered the field as a candidate for associate judge.

Chas. Derstine, the photographer, made a trip from Lewistown last week to take a number of views in different parts of the valley.

Spring Mill's two landlords are entertaining a number of city boarders. There is nothing to prevent that place from becoming a popular summer resort.

Miss Anna Keller left last Saturday for Freeburg, Snyder county, where she expects to attend Meyer's Musical College.

Rev. E. J. Wolf, D. D., of Gettysburg, who is visiting his brother, Wm. Wolf, in our town, occupied Dr. Fischer's pulpit, on Sabbath morning, and preached a learned discourse on the subject of Forgiveness.

John Sweetwood, of Georges Valley, who had been quite ill for a long time, died on Friday last. Mr. Sweetwood was one of the oldest persons in that neighborhood, where he resided and followed farming for a great many years.

On last Monday evening a number of our young men who for some time have been considering the advisability of reorganizing the band at this place assembled and made a move in that direction.

**Sardines and Ice Cream Cause Death.**

Ralph W. McLarren, of Clearfield county, was taken to the Philipsburg hospital one day last week, in a critical condition from ptomaine poisoning and died a few hours later.

On Thursday, the 14th, he ate salmon for dinner and at supper partook of both sardines and ice cream, a combination which, it is said, is almost certain to result seriously. Mr. McLarren became ill during the night and by Friday afternoon he was a very sick man, a condition in which he remained until death ended his sufferings.

Mr. McLarren, who was quite well known in Philipsburg as well as having a large acquaintanceship throughout his home county, was successfully engaged in farming and merchandising, for some time past having conducted a store at Morgan Run. He also mined and shipped coal. He was born at Morgan Run, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob McLarren, still reside, on March, 16, 1890.

Besides the parents and his wife, he is survived by two brothers and seven sisters.

The funeral took place Saturday afternoon. Burial was made at Osceola Mills.
