**Farm Calendar.**

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

**BLIGHTED POTATOES**—If potatoes have been severely attacked by late blight, it is advisable to allow the vines to dry thoroughly and dig under the driest possible conditions. Allow the rot to run its course and keep the potatoes dry, avoiding bin sweating. Do not injure your reputation by selling potatoes that will soon rot. If there has been no frost, an application of Bordeaux will save great loss.

**TREAT SEED WHEAT**—If the wheat to be used for seed has been affected by loose smut, it is advisable to use the hot water method of treatment. The County Agent will furnish information.

**PASTURING CLOVER**—Clover that was seeded in wheat last spring and has made a rank growth since wheat harvest may be pastured lightly where the ground is dry and firm, without injury to next year's hay crop.

**POULTRY**—How about winter quarters for the pullets? A clean house, fresh litter, mash hoppers and appliances will save a great deal of hurry and worry later on.

**DAIRY**—Warm Fall days will give trouble with milk souring. Keep the cans covered on the delivery wagon with a piece of canvas thoroughly wet with water enroute to the creamery.


