Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1887.

SEPTEMBER 22, 1887.

Potatoes are now selling at 50 cents. The chestnut crop will be a large one this fall.

Samuel Hess, of near Pine Grove Mills, is quite seriously ill of dysentery. Wednesday evening the Granger picnic ground was the scene of several disgraceful fights.

S. H. Dietzel, of Tusseyville, left for Lancaster, where he is a student in F. & M. college.

Col. Coburn, of Aaronsburg, has been suffering for the last few weeks from a very sore hand, caused by a spider bite while asleep in bed.

Thursday of the Grange picnic witnessed an immense gathering on the top of the mountain. The crowd could not have been less than 8,000 and may have reached 10,000.

R. Filson, sitting on the porch of the Lutheran parsonage, on Thursday afternoon, counted all the rigs that came down the mountain on this side from 3 to 6 p. m., and the number, on a careful count, reached 730.

Then perhaps 200 rigs were still remaining over on the ground. Fully as many conveyances came up from the other side of the mountain, which would make a total of all kinds of vehicles on the mountain on Thursday, about 1800.



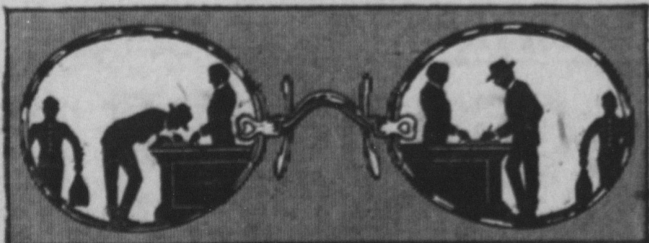
