

LAMONA FOWL IS OF GREAT MERIT

Government Poultry Experts Have Produced New Breed Possessing Fine Qualities.

LAYS WHITE-SHELLED EGGS

Body Is Long and of Good Depth, and Has Large Capacity for Reproductive Organs-Resistant to Weather Changes.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) The country will soon have a new breed of poultry, a white fowl with red ear lobes, that lays a white egg. developed by the poultry experts of the United States Department of Agriculture at the government experimental farm at Beltsville, Md. Heretofore, it is said, all breeds with red ear lobes have laid brown-shelled eggs. The project was conceived by Harry M.

Lamon, senior poultryman of the bureau of animal industry, and at the suggestion of the chief of that bureau Secretary Wallace named the breed Lamona, for the originator,

The new fowl possesses characteristics of great merit. It has sufficient size to fit the demands of the great number of consumers who want a bird weighing four to six pounds. The body is long and of good depth, giving a large amount of the highly desirable breast meat, and at the same time large capacity for the reproductive organs.

The Lamona fowl is larger than the Malaria, Chills, Fever and Grippe Leghorn, approaching in size fowls of the American class. It is white, which is most desirable from the market men's viewpoint. It has a comb and wattles of medium size which are not easily frosted, thereby checking development of egg production. It is well feathered, which makes it resistant to sudden changes in temperature.

Foundations of New Breed. The project resulting in the creation of the new Lamona was started in 1912, when the idea was conceived of combining three varieties of fowls to produce a breed having the shape and the market qualities of the Dorking. with a yellow skin, white plumage, and four toes, and laying a white egg. A low-stationed, close-feathered White "and be thankful for having had a Plymouth Rock male was mated to a Silver-Gray Dorking female; and a Single-Comb White Leghorn male, having a rather small, low comb, was mated to a Silver-Gray Dorking fe-

male. The second year the offspring of these crosses were mated separately, the females being trap-nested, and only the high producers of the largest and whitest eggs were used for breeders. Only males from high-producing females have been used at any time. The third year the results of the crosses of the second year were mated, and in addition, care was taken to select white specimens with yellow skins having only four toes. Since then it has been a task of careful selection and breeding.

The new breed is not yet ready for introduction, and no specimens or eggs will be sold until the characteristics sought have been more firmly fixed. It is as well or better developed than were several of the breeds and varieties when they were introduced by their breeders, but the specialists of the department believe that it is not

sufficient to have a few specimens that measure up to the ideal. They want the characteristics so well fixed that the fowls will produce a high percentage of progeny of the ideal type. When sufficient stock of such birds has been obtained specimens will be sent to state agricultural colleges and experiment stations to test their adaptability to different sections and con-

CO-OPERATIVE GRAIN MARKETING METHODS

Type of Elevator Should Fit Local Conditions.

Excellent System for One Section Will Not Always Work Out Successfully in Another - Comparative Study of Plans.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture.)

In co-operative grain marketing it is more essential that the system be sufted to conditions and practical need than it is that the system itself has been successfully applied in other fields. This has been brought out in an investigation conducted by specialists of the bureau of markets, United States Department of Agriculture, a report of which has just been published in department bulletin 937, "Cooperative Grain Marketing." One cannot carry his investigations of co-operative grain marketing far, says the bulletin, without realizing that what may be an excellent method for one section and for a particular condition will not always work out successfully in other sections or when applied to other conditions. The bulletin makes a comparative study of methods in the United States and Canada.

In the United States the most common type of farmers' grain elevators is owned and controlled by a body of stockholders in the immediate surrounding community, and the elevator is operated as a separate unit independently of any similar elevator.

In Canada the line-house type of farmers' elevator prevails and is highly successful. The line-house type consists of a number of elevators controlled by one central office in a large marketing center. Two such companies in Canada own and operate over 600 country elevators in the three great wheat-growing provinces.

In comparing the two systems, the ulletin states that the line-house operation of the farmers elevators would seem to offer the greatest advantage in those states where crops are some what uncertain or where the crop year is of short duration, and under which conditions it may be necessary to close the elevators for certain periods each year. It is possible under the linehouse method of operating elevators to economize in accounting and to fore the life of the tire is sapped. standardize in construction and in the machinery used.

Favoring single-unit elevators is a degree of community pride which usually centers around these organizations quite independent of the services rendered. In many sections there is a prejudice against centralized authority which is not easily overcome. Elevators in the Middle West section of the United States were established primarily to solve marketing problems of local character.

DECREASE IN POTATO YIELD

Weather So Unfavorable That Estimate on August 1 Showed Drop of 61,079,000 Bushels.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Although the potato acreage is estimated by the bureau of markets and crop estimates, United States Department of Agriculture, to be 3,972,000 or 1.6 per cent greater than last year,

the weather during July was so unfavorable that the estimated yield on August 1 showed a drop of 61,079,000 bushels from the indicated yield on July 1. The figures for yield were placed at 315,918,000 bushels, as compared with 428,368,000 for 1920 and a five-year average of 371.283,000. Prices reflected the change in condition. On July 16 the average of ten leading markets was \$3 to \$4.75 per barrel for Virginia Eastern Shore Cobblers and \$1.25 to \$2.15 per 100 pounds for Kansaş Early Ohlos. By August 12 Virginia Eastern Shore Cobblers had advanced frm \$4.75 to \$5.50, while Kansas Early Ohios were selling at \$2,40 to \$3.25; Idaho Rurals were moving at \$3.50 to \$3.60 per 100 pounds.

POOR TUBES ARE **GREAT HANDICAP**

Standard Makes Mean Safety, Whereas "Bargains" Are Likely to Cause Trouble.

GUARD AGAINST SLOW LEAKS

Cap on End of Valve Helps to Hold Air and Should Be on Tight-Washer Likewise Has Important Function to Perform.

The well-being of 86 per cent of a motorist's tire investment depends upon 14 per cent-the relation of casing to tube costs. A great part of tire trouble is the direct result of under-Inflation, with the inner tube the offender. Yet the average car owner peither knows the name of his tubes nor the length of their service.

Cheap and unbranded tubes handicap any casing. The best is at the mercy of a poor tube. The difference in tubes is tremendous. A standard make inner tube is built of almost pure rubber and has a strength of between one and one and one-half tons per cross section inch. This means that if the tube stock were built up to a square test piece one inch thick and one inch wide, it would be strong enough to lift from 1,000 to 3,000 pounds. Inferior tubes do not have this strength and tre highly com-

Life Usually Long, as Casing.

On an average it is possible to build life into an inner tube only equal to that of the casing. It is false economy to use an old tube in a new casing. Inferior and wornout tubes should be quickly discarded. The tube which has delivered full service during the life of one tire is almost certain to have developed slow leaks. When a tube fails to hold air it is

A: a general average in all services It has been found that pressure in a tire properly taken care of and when a good tube is used will decrease about five pounds in two weeks. When this ratio is greatly exceeded, the tube should be examined without delay be-

Valve Cap Should Be Tight.

It is well to remember that the cap on the end of the valve stem helps to make the tube hold air. Often when the valve inside is leaking, pressure may be retained without a rapid decrease by screwing the cap on tightly Its function is to assist the valve, and its use is imperative. The washer is likewise furnished for a purpose and should be used. It holds the valve stem in proper position also that it cannot pull loose nor the tube be pinched, and keeps out water.

With a standard-make tire, use a standard-make tube. "Bargain" tubes mean tire trouble and ruin the profit and pleasure of motoring.


CORRECT ALIGNMENT OF BIG IMPORTANCE

Auto Wheels Out of Line Give Short Tire Life.

Many Owners Do Not Attempt Task Because of Lack of Knowledge-Easy and Accurate Method Is Shown in Illustration:

Lining up the wheels of an autonobile is a problem that many motorists do not attempt because they do not know how; but the following method is easy and accurate in every

Set the car in an open space on at absolutely flat floor. Place two boxes on the floor, one about two feet from the rear right wheel. Now stretch a string between the two boxes, being careful to keep the string at an even

distance from the floor. Measure from this string to the front and rear parts of the right front and rear tires. If the distances are not equal, shift the boxes or the steering wheel until they are exactly so. The string will then be exactly parallel to the line of the wheels on that side.


Then, with a second pair of boxes and a string, do the same thing on the left side, thereby obtaining another When this is accomplished, measure across from one line to the other, making sure that these two are equal distances from the wheels. Do the same at the rear. If these two measurements agree exactly, the wheels are in alignment.-Popular Science Monthly.

TO AVOID MAGNETO TROUBLE

Remove Distributor Cover Once a Month and Wipe Out-Also Clean Breaker Points.

While the magneto only needs two drops of oil in each bearing every thousand miles it is well to remove the distributor cover once a month and wipe out with a cloth dipped in gasoline. At the same time pass a piece of double-ought sand-paper between the breaker points to remove any corresion that may be forming. This will put off magneto troubles almost indefinitely.
