Dr. D. K. Musser, the local dentist, on Friday returned from a two weeks' visit to Plainfield, New Jersey, and to Philadelphia, visiting a niece at the former place and a brother at the latter place.

Dr. H. S. Braucht, of Spring Mills, medical examiner of the public schools, visited the Centre Hall schools this week in his official capacity. He gave particular attention to the matter of vaccination.

The excitement of the deer chase reached fever pitch on last Thursday evening, following the report of the most successful first day in the history of the sport. Every available gun was shouldered and feet directed toward the Seven Mountains the following day.

Cleveland Mitterling is contemplating going to Hot Springs, Arkansas, soon after the holidays, for the benefit of his health. He is slowly recovering from his recent serious illness, but hopes to be permanently cured by spending a season at the famous health resort in Arkansas.

D. K. Keller was sworn in as a new member of the Centre Hall school board at a meeting of the board on Monday evening. H. G. Strohmeier, who was re-elected for a term of six years, also took the oath of office. Mr. Strohmeier has been a member of the board for the past twenty years.

Miss Schepps, Red Cross nurse from State College, was in Centre Hall on Friday to arrange for a dental clinic to be held for the benefit of the school children, in the school house, at a date to be announced later, which, however, will be on a Saturday, so as not to interfere with the school sessions.

The Grange News complains because it cost \$417,000 a year to conduct the state department of education and its pay roll contains the names of 146 persons whereas under the administration of the late Dr. Schaeffer the highest expense reached by the department in any one year was \$53,000 for the employment of twenty-seven persons.

Troops of the Pennsylvania National Guard will help the Department of Forestry fight fire in the woods of this State. Adjutant General Beary, at the suggestion of Gifford Pinchot, the State's Chief Forester, has instructed commanders of companies to co-operate with district foresters, and he authorized the use of horses and equipment in fire prevention work.

The new postmaster at Centre Hall, Robert M. Smith, whose appointment was confirmed by the U. S. Senate just before its final adjournment in November, will assume the duties of his office on January 1st. So far as is known at present, the post office will remain in the Reporter building. Mr. Smith has all his credentials and could take his place any time, but for personal reasons prefers to wait until the opening of the New Year before doing so.

Rev. Dr. Robert M. Campbell, who recently tendered his resignation as pastor of the Graysville Presbyterian church, which congregation he had served for the past nineteen years, had a record which few ministers residing in the small town districts can equal. He baptized 264 infants, 106 adults; performed 130 marriage ceremonies; preached 31 funeral sermons. Since his ordination as a minister in 1867, he has preached a total of 5,230 sermons.

Two hotel men—William McKenzie and James M. Griffey, proprietors of the St. Cloud hotel and Central hotel, Houtzdale, plead guilty to selling liquor before Judge Bell and were sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 each and undergo imprisonment for thirty days. "Dry" detectives watched the hotels and noted who entered, and finally summoned the burgess, Anselm Stotty, before the grand jury, and it was his testimony that led the violators to acknowledge the illegal selling.

**THE DEATH RECORD.**

**ZEIGLER**—John W. Zeigler, born July 21, 1863, in Walker township, died at Robersburg December 2nd, 1921, aged sixty-eight years, four months and eleven days. He was married to Anna M. Wolfe, July 16, 1882, who survives him with the following brothers and sisters: Charles, of Sugar Grove, Ill.; George, of Farmville, Va.; Susan, wife of O. W. Hoy, of Farmington, Mo.; Alice, wife of Arthur Miller, Indiana; Emma, wife of Calvin Stover, of Cass, Va.; Ida, wife of Alvin Heinke, of Campton, Ill.; Elizabeth, wife of William Nickleton, of Big Run; Cora, wife of William Dermot, of Sykesville. He was baptized Sept. 23, 1853, by Rev. W. R. Yearick, and was a faithful and consistent member of the Lutheran church, and an honored citizen in the community. Funeral services were held on Tuesday morning at 9:30, with services at the house, conducted by Rev. Shultz. Interment was made in the Union cemetery, Robersburg.

**LONBERGER**—Mrs. Hattie Lonberger, wife of Bruce Lonberger, of Boalsburg, died after a brief illness of pneumonia, on Tuesday, at her home. She had just returned from a visit to relatives in Virginia, and was in fine spirits when illness overtook her. Mrs. Lonberger was aged about 33 years and a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Reitz, of Boalsburg, both of whom survive, as do also her husband, five children and four brothers—Robert, Samuel, Israel and Frederick. Time of burial not announced at this writing.

**MARTZ**—Mrs. Daniel Martz, of Boalsburg, died on Tuesday, aged about 53 years. She underwent an operation about three months ago, from which she never fully recovered, the operation being for the arrest of a cancerous growth. Her husband and two daughters, Mrs. John Jacobs, of Boalsburg, and Emma, at home, survive. Her maiden name was Thomas. The time of the funeral, at this writing, has not been announced.

**Hunter's Bullet Wounds Woman.**  
With a serious gunshot wound in her left shoulder, Mrs. John Miller, who lives near the Mount mine settlement, between Houtzdale and Madera, was taken to the Cottage State hospital at Philipsburg on Saturday.

The wound was the result of a rather odd accident on Saturday morning. Hunters, who were about 200 yards from the Miller dwelling, which is on the border of the woods, were firing at game. One of the bullets entered the house, struck the stove and ricocheted, lodging in the shoulder of Mrs. Miller who was standing near the stove.

Mrs. Miller is 67 years old and rather frail. The wound is a painful one.

Reuben Maines, an 18 year old Curwensville boy, is a patient at the Clearfield hospital minus his left hand as the result of a hunting accident on Friday morning.

The young man with his father and several others were hunting rabbits down in Bradford township. About 8 o'clock while young Maines was sitting on a log with his hand over the muzzle of the gun, in some unexplained manner the gun was discharged and the load passed through the hand, shattering and mangleing it to such an extent that amputation was necessary.

At the hospital Dr. Lever F. Stewart took the hand off at the wrist.
