A FEDERAL BUILDING FOR PHILIPSBURG.

If New Bill Is Passed Philpsburg Will Get a New \$80,000 Federal Building.

An omnibus bill will be considered by the Committee on Public Grounds and Buildings as soon as the next session of Congress convenes, to discuss the proposed building of an \$80,000 Federal Building in Philpsburg.

This bill has been pending for some time past and the complete discussion of it will take place as stated above.

The other items under consideration by the committee are as follows: Lewistown, \$6,500 for a post office; Phoenixville, \$50,000 post office; Sayre, \$5,000 post office; State College, \$5,000 post office; Sunbury, \$50,000 post office; Beaver Falls, \$58,000 post office; Tyrone, \$75,000 post office; Lewisburg, \$100,000 post office; Middletown, \$75,000 post office; Pottsville, \$144,000 post office; Scranton, \$515,000 post office; Williamsport, \$110,000 post office; Lancaster, \$500,000 post office and headquarters for internal revenue collection district; Bloomsburg, \$20,000 post office; Columbia, \$20,000 post office.

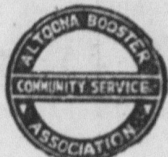

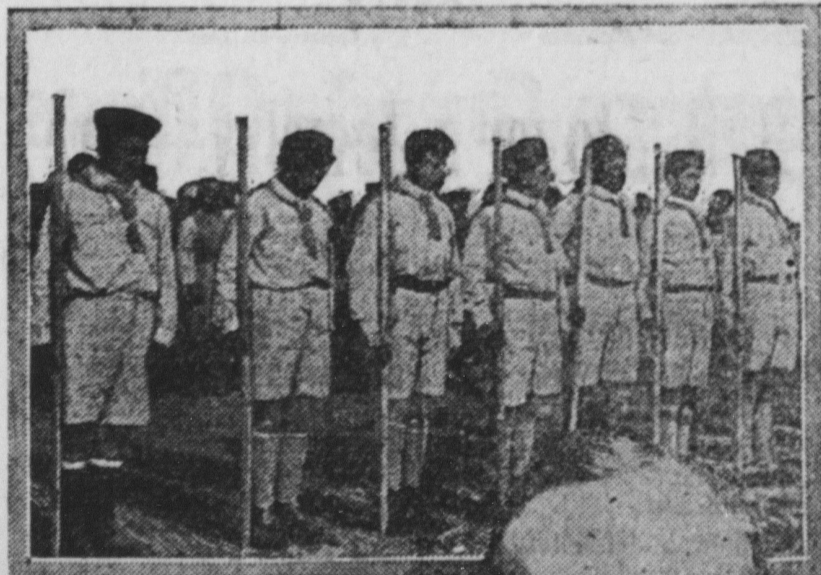

35,000 Armenian Kiddies, American Trained, the Hope for Future Peace

The baseball diamond, the football gridiron, boy and girl scout organizations, and other institutions of the American youth will play their part in the final peace in the Levant, according to Charles V. Vickrey, general secretary of the Near East Relief, who is now on a tour of inspection of the work being done by that organization in Transcaucasia.

"Behind the walls of American schools and orphanages, one finds the only tranquil spots in this whole troubled territory," he writes. Here, despite disorder, pestilence, and starvation, outside the gates, ambitious young Armenian boys and girls are making the best of the opportunities offered them by their American teachers. If only our work can be continued until these children reach maturity a new generation will arise to face the problems of the Near East with the benefit of their American training to help them. At present, however, we are confronted by the possibility of having to abandon them because of lack of funds. This will mean not only the wasting of what has already been accomplished but will also result in the death of the majority of these wards of American charity. Several hundred of them

died during a brief period last spring when the interior stations in the Caucasus were cut off from American food. On the other hand, a continuation of the full relief program can not help but mean a better, more peaceful region in the future. Approximately ninety thousand children in Anatolia, Cilicia, and Syria, besides the 35,000 in Transcaucasia, are receiving American training at present, according to Mr. Vickrey.
