BELL PREDICTED **GIGANTIC GROWTH** FOR TELEPHONE

Told Londoners in 1878 His Invention Would Become Nationwide System

A prophecy that has been proved to have been almost uncannily correct was made by Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone, in 1878, two years after his first patents had been filed, when he pictured for a group of London business men the possible development of the instrument, then looked upon as merely an interesting scientific toy, into a tremendously important

factor in economic and social life. Bell returned to America discouraged at his failure to arouse interest in his project. worn out by his efforts, ready to forget forever the picture he had so optimistically painted in London but found that his little circle of American backers had not lost their faith and were quietly going on with

their plans to develop his invention. And it was not in England, where this prediction was made, but in America, where he had worked untiringly to perfect his first telephone, that his forecast of the future

was first fulfilled. Calling the attention of his hearers to the intricate water and gas systems that lay under the streets, communicating by side pipes with the various dwellings and enabling consumers to draw their supplies from a common source. Bell based his prediction upon the analogy between these systems and that into which he believed

the telephone could be developed "It is conceivable," he declared, "that cables of telephone wires could be laid under ground, or suspended overhead, communicating by branch wires with private dwellings. country houses, shops. manufactories, etc., uniting them through the main cable with a central office where the wire could be connected as desired, establishing direct communication between any two places in the city Such a plan as this, though Impracticable at the present moment, will, I firmly believe, be the outcome of the introduction of the telephone to the public. Not only so, but I believe in the future wires will unite the head offices of telephone companies in different cities, and a man in one part of the country may communicate by word of mouth with another in a distant

"In regard to other present uses for the telephone the instrument can be supplied so cheaply as to compete on favorable terms with speaking tubes, bells and annunciators, as a means of communication between different parts of the house. This seems to be a very favorable application of the telephone not only on account of the large number of telephones that would be wanted, but because it would lead eventually to the plan of intercommunication referred to

"Although there is a great field for the telephone in the immediate present, I believe there is still greater in the future.

"By bearing in mind the great object to be ultimately achieved. I believe that the telephone company can not only secure for itself a business of the most remunerative kind but also benefit the public in a way that has never been previously attempted."

TELEPHONES PLAYED BIG WAR DRAMA ROLE

According to the chief signal officer of the A. E. F., two armies, twelve corps, thirtythree divisions and forty-five field signal battalions were completely equipped with telephone supplies. The signal corps constructed 1.990 miles of permanent pole lines with 28,000 miles of wire, put up 3,230 miles of wire on French poles and installed approximately 40,000 miles of combat lines.

Telephone exchanges on permanent lines in France numbered 273, and those in the advance section 123, besides small temporary field installations.

About 1.600,000 long distance telephone calls were handled by the signal corps, together with local telephone calls estimated at 47,000.000. The organization of this system required the services of a veritable army of telephone experts, the Bell System alone having contributed 11.299 employees who served overseas. Girl telephone operators of the system to the number of 233 went to France in the uniform of the signal corps.

So completely organized was the system of telephone communications that it has been said that if he had desired to do so. General Pershing could have taken up his telephone at his headquarters in Chaumont and called up any second lieutenant, sitting at the end of a wire in an advance post, anywhere along the entire sector occupied by the American forces.

Over 13,000,000 pounds of old rope were fed to the giant vats which tore, cooked, washed and beat into a pulp the makings of 7,000,000 pounds of cable paper used by the Bell Telephone system last year.
