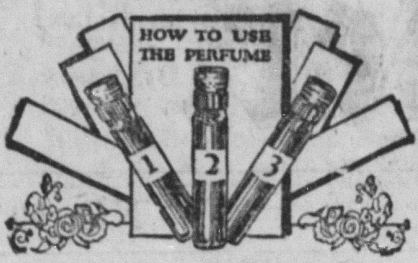

PENNSYLVANIA STATE ITEMS

Altoona.—Upwards of a quarter of a million dollars is being paid out by Altoona banks to depositors in Christmas and thrift clubs.

Bridgeport.—Taken ill in the mines of the H. C. Fricke Coke company here, Louis Doms, 34, dropped dead as he entered his home.

Lewistown.—J. Albert Esh, a farmer of Armagh township, Mifflin county, has been drawn as a grand juror and his wife, Bertha M. Esh, has been drawn as a petit juror to serve at the January term of court.

Harrisburg.—Plans are being rapidly worked out for launching early in the new year the most comprehensive survey yet made of the charitable and similar institutions of the state government with a view to forming a basis for the operations of the new department of public welfare.

Pottsville.—Frank McGann, aged 45, of Branchdale, was killed at the Otto colliery by a dynamite explosion set by himself.

Lewisburg.—The dearest deer on record in this vicinity will take exactly \$3300 from the pockets of a party of hunters detected in an alleged violation of the game law.

Harrisburg.—His wife becoming the mother of a baby girl in the Polytechnic Hospital, Charles Gilberthorpe was released from the Dauphin county jail on parole by Judge Fox.

Harrisburg.—Twenty persons were injured near the Pittsburgh city line when an automobile bus in which they were riding overturned while running down a hill.

New Castle.—Pete Crist, convicted of killing Officer Cudia, on May 1, 1918, was sentenced to death in the electric chair by Judge S. Plummer Emery here.

Connellsville.—Business and professional men of Connellsville, Scottdale and vicinity have formed a country club.

Pottsville.—Noel Specht, aged 17, of Cressona, who was shot by his brother, Richard, with a German army pistol, died.

Beaver.—F. I. Kerr, awaiting trial here on an indictment returned in connection with the death of his stepson, Lawrence Stewart, also is being held in connection with the hold-up and killing of Taylor Colynckak, at Monaca, in 1918.

Harrisburg.—Dr. William C. Sandy, who has been connected with research work in New York and South Carolina, assumed his duties as director of the bureau of mental health in the new department of public welfare.

Pittsburgh.—Major Jolver, negro, was killed by an unidentified man in front of his home here. He had just left the house on his way to work when he was shot.

Bethlehem.—The children of Grace Lutheran Sunday school brought 1000 sticks of candy to school for a Christmas box to be sent to the children of the Lutheran missions in the Virgin Islands.

Morristown.—Frank Groh, a wire-drawer here, who has been missing for four days, was found dead, his body lying on his bed with a bullet wound through his heart when friends broke into his bungalow where he lived.

York.—McClean Stock, Republican chairman of York county for the past six years, was notified of his appointment as postmaster of York.

McAdoo.—Business men here have pledged \$3000 to start a fund to buy land for a public park and equip it.
