Mrs. Annie Short, mother of United States Marshal and editor of the Clearfield Republican, John P. Short, died in Clearfield, following a stroke of apoplexy. She was the last survivor of seventeen children.

Mrs. A. Mitchell Palmer Dead.

Mrs. A. Mitchell Palmer, wife of former attorney general of the United States, died in Washington Wednesday of last week.
She had been suffering from heart trouble ever since her return to Washington from Stroudsburg, this state, last September. Recently her illness manifested itself in a series of sinking spells. Mrs. Palmer was 53 years of age. Because of poor health she had not been active in Washington society for several years. She was a daughter of the late State Senator Dixon, of Easton, Md. She leaves one daughter, Mary Dixon Palmer.

Bonded Tobacco Warehouse.

Pennsylvania is to have one of the first tobacco warehouses bonded under the U. S. warehouse act. Plans have been developed by the Mt. Joy Farm Products' Company, Mt. Joy, Lancaster county, to accept tobacco from growers in Lancaster county, sweat and pack it for them and to sell it on the instructions of the growers at a time satisfactory to them. While the tobacco is in the possession of the Mt. Joy company arrangements have been made so that advances of 10 cents per pound can be secured from the bankers interested in the proposition. A charge of 2 cents per pound will be made by the company for packing cases and other incidental expenses.

Veteran Editor Dies.

Calvin William Gutelius, a native of Mifflinburg and a member of a famous pioneer family, which, according to tradition, was founded by a high caste Frenchman who was banished from France by royal edict for marrying out of his station, died a few days ago at his home in Northumberland at the age of eighty-four years.

He had been active in founding Democratic newspapers throughout Central Pennsylvania, working as a journalist at Bellefonte, Sunbury and other places prior to 1872, when he established the Public Press at Northumberland which was published continuously until 1917. He had been ill for some time. His widow and eight sons and daughters survive him.
