Report on Wheat in Elevators.

Stocks of wheat in country mills and elevators March 1 were estimated at 72,500,000 bushels by the U. S. department of agriculture.

This is the smallest quantity in the record of reports made to the department for that date during the past ten years, with the exception of March 1, 1918, when the abnormal low stocks of 66,000,000 bushels followed the small wheat crop of 1917.

HOW THE A. E. F. SAFEGUARDED COMMUNICATION

Complete Wire System Center Built by Signal Corps at La Belle Epines

There is almost a "Now-It-Can-Be-Told" flavor in the story of the precautions taken by the American signal corps in France to safeguard its system of communications.

He had another. At Gievres, the great A. E. F. supply center, the Signal Corps had in reserve a complete duplicate of every bit of telephone and telegraph equipment that would be necessary to reestablish and reinstall a system exactly like that in operation at Paris.

The telephone cable connecting Cuba with the United States has been in operation only a relatively short time. The presidents of the two republics exchanged greetings in the first conversation over the new line last April, when a distinguished gathering of diplomats and cabinet officers at Washington, and a similar assemblage at Havana heard officials of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company demonstrate the possibilities of long distance telephony.

BANKING HOUSES FIND BOON IN CUBAN CABLE

Banks and financial houses in New York have made constant use of the telephone in communicating with their representatives and correspondents in Cuba, over the new Havana-Key West cable, ever since the break in the price of sugar caused such a strain on the financial resources of the island republic.
