flavor in the story of the precautions taken by the American signal corps in France to · feguard its system of communications, as told by Captain A. Lincoln Lavine, formerly of the A. E. F. Air Service, who has made a study of the history of the part played by communications in the World War.

HOW THE A.E.F.

SAFEGUARDED

COMMUNICATION

The City of Paris, bombed every moonlight night by Bosche airplanes and shelled by the super-gun of the Germans, was decidedly unsafe for a central switching system. At any time a bomb or a shell might wreck the system and cause damage which it would take a long time to repair. So the Chief Signal Officer, General Edgar Russel, quietly, unobirusively-so quietly and unobtrusively that few A. E. F. veterans know about it even today-had built up a central switching system for the whole of France at a point some distance from Paris, known as La Belle Epincs.

"But that is not all. La Belle Epines was only one string to General Russel's bow in safeguarding Paris communications. He had another. At Gievres, the great A. E. F. supply centre, the Signal Corps had in reserve a complete duplicate of every bit of telephone and telegraph equipment that would be necessary to refurnish and reinstall a system exactly like that in operation in Paris. Every item that would have to go into making up an exact working replica of the existing Paris system was to be found in its proper box or crate with an envelope attached to it, inside of which was a complete description of the contents, while in separate boxes were to be found specifications telling exactly how and where each item of equipment was to be set up."


