A survey of New York state school children shows that three-fourths of them are physically defective. That means seventy-five per cent of them fave imperfections of one kind or another.

The same survey revealed only thirteen per cent, of farm children with local farm sales in Centre county defects which, greatly increases the percentage of imperfections among city children.

There may be a few advantages that city life can offer which the country cannot, but these never seem to severely handicap the rural bred boy and girl who in almost any competition in life with their city cousins are capable of holding their own and many times showing dust to the urban dwellers.
