Taft Kills Child Labor Laws.

The child labor law was declared unconstitutional in the Supreme Court.

The law enacted in 1919 was intended to regulate employment of children in any mill, tannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment under the age of 14 or in any mine or quarry under 16 by imposing an excise tax of 10 per cent on the net annual profits of those employing such labor. It was attacked on the ground that it attemped to regulate an exclusive state function in violation of the constitution and was defined as a mere excise tax levied by Congress. The opinion was declared by Chief Justice Taft with no dissent announced.

Focht Defeated.

Congressman Benjamin K. Focht was defeated for the nomination for congressman by H. M. Beers, of Huntingdon. Focht lost his county by from six to seven hundred; his home town of Lewisburg by 252, and his own ward by 100.

Unofficial' complete returns give Edward M. Beers, of Huntingdon, a majority of twelve votes over Hon. B. F. Focht in the Eighteenth Congressional district.
