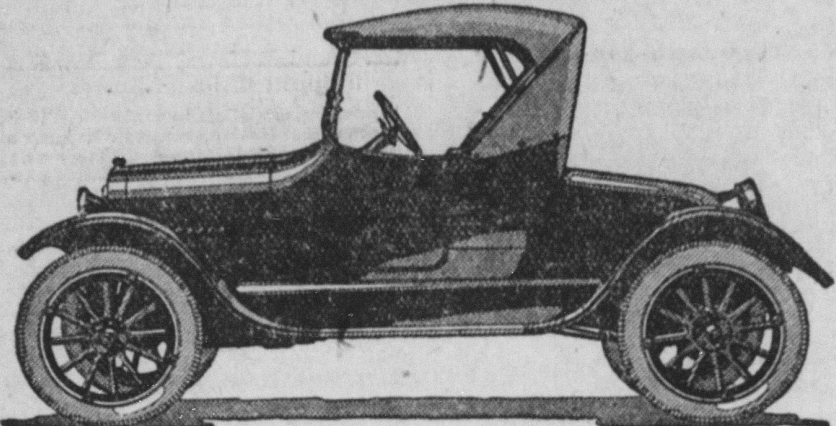

"It was Pouring."

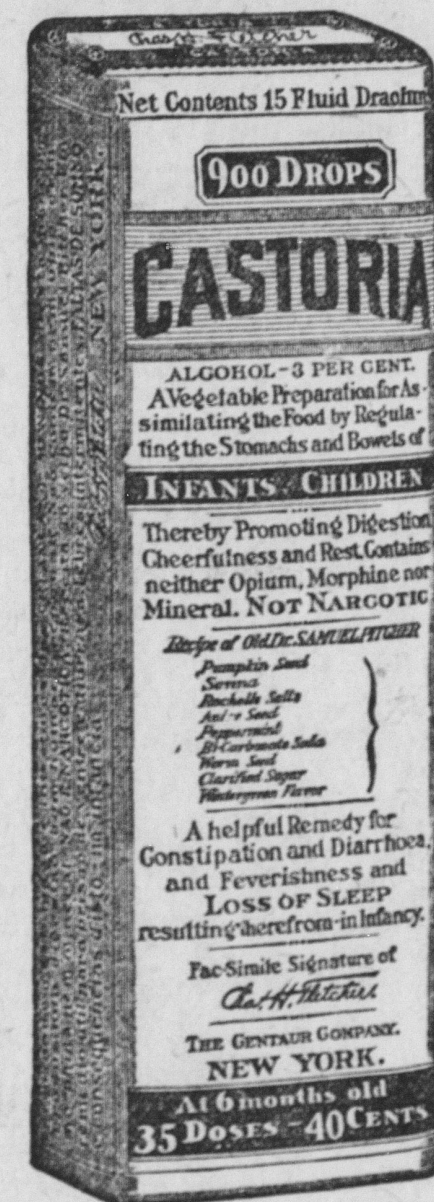
