Blackbirds Hide the Sun.

A special dispatch from Lewistown makes the above caption appropriate. There may have been one or two birds omitted in the count, but the Reporter gives the news just as it got it. Here it is:

Hundreds of thousands of blackbirds assembled in an oat field along the main line of the Pennsylvania Railroad one mile west of Lewistown, Thursday of last week. It appeared to be some kind of a bird convention and their chattering drowned the noise of passing trains. It is estimated that 10,000 of them roosted on one wire of a 150-foot span of the Pennsylvania's telegraph lines and a gun fired along the borders of the field caused a cloud of birds to rise that actually obscured the sun. They were flying southward to escape the low temperatures of the past two nights, which came near to the frost line.

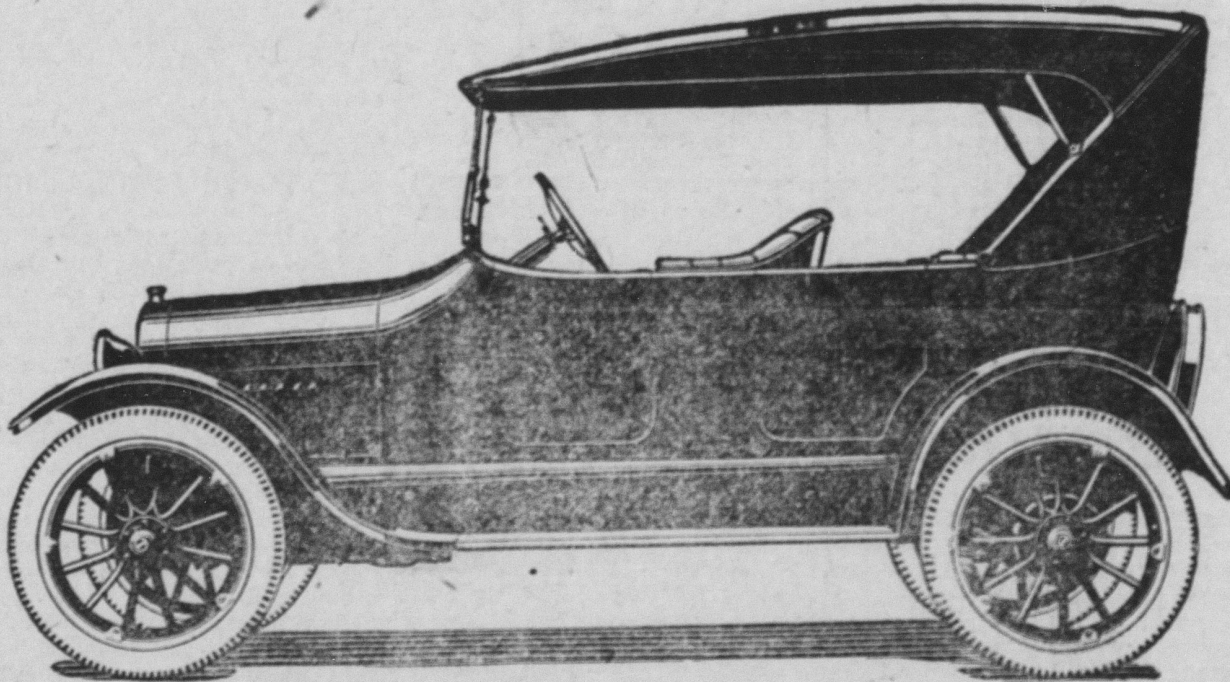
