**Haynes at Philipsburg.**

The Centre County W. C. T. U. convention will be held at Philipsburg Thursday and Friday, September 14th and 15th, and will be of unusual interest because of the fact that the two evening addresses will be by distinguished men. On Thursday evening the speaker will be federal prohibition commissioner Roy A. Haynes, who will make the trip from Washington especially for that meeting. It is rather unusual for a man in Commissioner Haynes' position to speak outside the larger cities but the Centre County W. C. T. U. has been fortunate in securing him for the above date and a large crowd should turn out to hear him. The other prominent speaker will be Mrs. Culla J. Vaynigher, of Indiana, national W. C. T. U. director of Americanization. Mrs. Vaynigher has a vivid personality and is a forceful and interesting speaker. She was president of the Indiana State W. C. T. U. for eighteen years and is now a nominee for the State Senate in Indiana.

**Cave in Millin County Explored.**

For the first time Alexander's Cave, which is the source of Honey Creek, and which is located on the Alexander farm near Honey Creek station, has been explored. John Spellman, Henry Smith and George McClenahan, all of Conneville, who have been spending their vacation near Milroy, built a boat, equipped it with electric lights and ventured into the cave, which is similar to Penns Cave, near Centre Hall.

On entering the cave the men found a perfect image of an Indian formed of rock. Further on, two images, snow white, were found. Going farther into the cave the explorers found a room the walls of which rose perpendicularly for over fifty feet, the ceiling and sides of which glistened like gold. In some places the water was thirty-five feet deep and in others barely deep enough to float their craft. Residents of the locality are looking forward to a vision of this cave becoming as popular as the famous Penns Cave. A boat will likely be placed on the under-ground water course and an opportunity given to others to view the cavern.
