Why Some Strike.

Eight-hour day, national agreement shop rules, recognition of the union, sympathy are only ripples on the surface. Deep down in the unseen cause is the wage system itself, fundamentally wrong. B. M. Jewell, spokesman for the striking shopcrafts, declared that to support his family properly a man must earn over \$2600 per year. He put it too strong; yet my own family of seven costs more. In 12 years of single manhood my wages averaged \$800 per year and board; yet I saved up \$4700, the foundation for my present moderate fortune. The claim has been made that even at the 1921 wage, bituminous miners did not average \$600 per year. On the other hand, increased wages increase prices of product; and the increased cost of living leaves us no better off. Any one except a fool should know that wages enough for one will not support seven. Such folly is the wage system based on equal pay for equal work.

When a father of five wants to be honest and can't pay his bills, or cannot afford the doctor for his sick wife, he is ready to strike from sheer des peration. And his unmarried comrade who in one day at the same wage earns enough to keep him four, can afford to lay off and help the strike along. God bless the young men and women who undertake matrimony. The women who become mothers are the noblest of God's creation. Shall we continue to punish them with grinding toll, poverty, privation and distress, or is not the pain of childbirth and the anxious care over health and morals enough for their share?

Employers should pay fair wages for the single; nation, state and township should aid mothers and children. If the supply of children stops, the nation perishes, and America becomes a wilderness.

I, the watchman, have sounded an alarm.
