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Woodward District Has Three Fires. -

Three fires occurred the week of October 1st on the Bald Eagle district. All were near Woodward-the first on the knob just south of that place, the second about a mile farther east and the third near the state highway about a mile east of the town. In each case Ranger Motz had his well trained crew of fire fighters on the job very soon after the discovery of the fire and by fast and efficient work succeeded in getting the fires under control before tey had spread over a very large ares. All three burned less than twenty-five acres. Because of the extreme drought everything was killed and the humus destroyed. At many places the fire burned a foot deep in the ground and the task of keeping the fires under control was even greater than putting them out. Water was carried and hauled at many places and at other places the lines had to be trenched to Mrs. Wilmer M. Stover, of Aaronsburg, mineral soil. The recent rains finished the task of extinction.

All of the fires were of incendiary origin. Why some outlaws persist in trying to burn that beautiful country is not definitely known. It is definitely known that every good citizen of that region was on he job and supported Ranger Motz loyally. Travelers along the state highway stopped their autos and offered assistance, a number of them going to the fire line and


