**The Mennonites.**

The Reedsville correspondent to the Belleville Times gives a brief history of the Mennonites, which will be of interest to many of the Reporter readers and is reprinted. The correspondent later promises to call attention to the Amish.  
"The Mennonites are a Protestant denomination that was founded in Zurich, Switzerland, by Menno Simons in the 16th century. It spread throughout Central Europe. They refused to participate in civic duties, bear arms or take oaths, and this led to considerable persecution which inspired immigration of many to Moravia and Holland. There the Anabaptists had flourished until they came to disaster under the leadership of John of Leyden (the incident on which Meyerbeer based his opera, 'The Prophet'), when Menno reassembled their scattered forces and merged them with the Mennonites. In 1683 responding to William Penn's promise of religious liberty in his Province many came and settled in this state, building a church in Germantown. The sect is now divided into twelve branches."

Jacob Musser, of Pine Creek, suffered a second stroke of paralysis while hauling wood from his woodland, near the home of W. C. Warntz. He had fallen off his wagon and when found was lying between a front wheel and the hind feet of the horse, it being presumed he had laid there for from four to five hours. He was conveyed to his home, where he has since been in a critical condition.

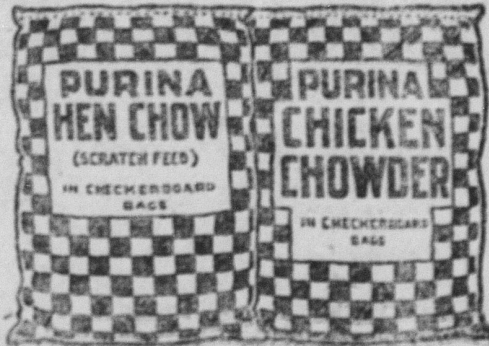

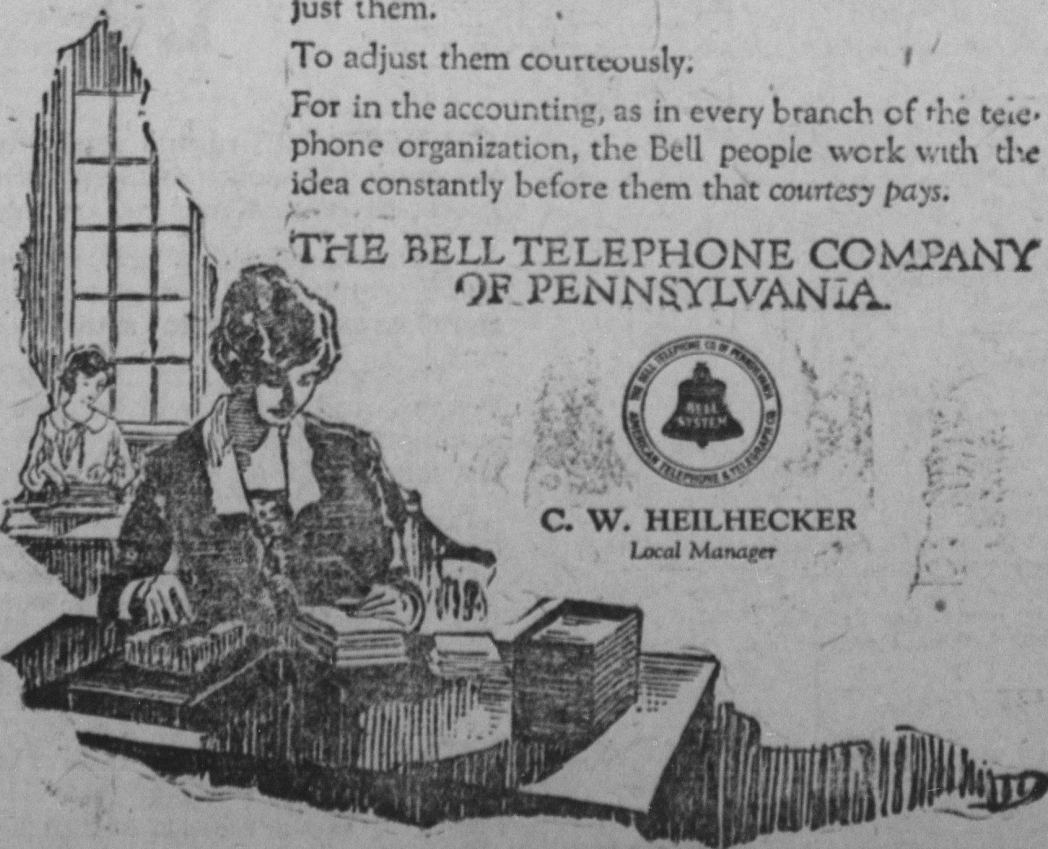
