



MORE TIMBER IS **BOYS AND GIRLS VIE** IN HUGE EXPOSITION **NEED OF NATION**

Twelve States Represented by Teams at Sioux City.

More Than 130,000 Club Members Made Demonstrations-Received Instruction in Better Farming and Home Making,

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Farm boys and girls enrolled as club members by extersion agents cooperatively employed by the United States Department of Agriculture and the state agricultural colleges were represented by champion demonstration and judging teams for the 12 central states at the interstate boys' and girls' clubs exhibit and encampment at Sloux City, Iowa. Over 3.900 of these teams competed in 1921 for representation at Sloux City, putting on nearly 10,000 public demonstrations

of club activities. The total enrollment in the 12 states last year was more than 130,000 club members, whose production was valued at \$2,-640,000.

The United States Department of Agriculture co-operated this year with



the state agricultural colleges and the fair association in the installation of a striking series of 12 booths in the special boys' and girls' clubs building. exemplifying the leading lines of club work, as follows: Illinois, corn; Iowa, poultry; Kansas, pigs and sorghum; Michigan, handicraft; Minnesota, bread; Missouri, home m





TAKE GOOD CARE OF MANURE

Deteriorates at Least One-Half in Value if Allowed to Stand Out in Weather.

When a person stops to consider that, at the present prices of commercial fertilizer, one ton of average fresh stable manure is worth about \$3 per ton and that the same manure is worth only a little more than one-half that much after it has been allowed to stand out in the weather for a few months, he will see the value of taking proper care of this material.



Much Attention Is Given to Fertilizing Soil for Grain Crops-Grass is Neglected.

Why is it that pastures are overworked and neglected? More attention is now, given to fertilizing ground foregrain crops than ever before, but not much attention is given to pastures. Those who have areas which they wish to keep in grass may help matters very materially by apply log ground limestone to these lands. stroyed.

Tree Commandments

1. Do not allow roots to be exposed to the sun, drying winds or frosts. 2. Prune with a sharp, clean cut any broken or injured roots. 3. Have the holes large enough to admit all the roots without cramping.

4. Plant in fine loam, enriched, with thoroughly decomposed manure.

5. Do not allow any green, unfermented manure to come in contact with roots.

6. Spread out the roots in their natural position and work fine loam among them, making

it firm and compact. 7. Do not plant too deep, Let upper roots be set an inch lower than before.

8 Remove all broken branches and cut back at least one-half of the previous year's growth of wood.

9. If the season lacks the usual rainfall, water thoroughly twice a week. 10. After-Culture-Keep soil

in a good degree of fertility. Mulching the trees in autumn with manure is beneficial .--Draper.

ROTATE TO DESTROY INSECTS

Working Soil at Different Seasons of Year Keeps Down Weeds and Injurious Bugs.

Weeds and insects are more easily controlled by practicing a rotation because, for different crops, the soil is worked at different seasons of the year, and thus weeds which are prevalent at one season may be destroyed by growing a spring crop and those prevaent in another season by growing a crop for which the ground is worked in the fall. The same is true of insects which affect one crop but not another; thus, by rotating crops on a field insects are also largely do-


