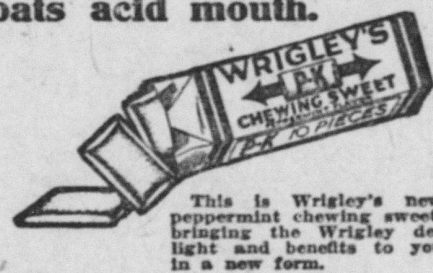

"You should say Thomas, my boy," said the master "And what is your brother's name?"

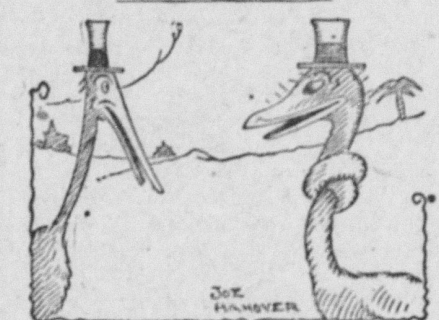
"Jackass," replied Tom.
