113 BUCKS KILLED FIRST FOUR DAYS OF SEASON.

Single Division of Seven Mountain District Yields Large Returns to Hunters—33 Parties and 9 Single Hunters Meet With Success.—9 Does Killed.

The division of the Seven Mountain forest presided over by William F. McKinney, forester, whose headquarters is at the State House along the State Highway leading across the Seven Mountains, during the first four days of the hunting season, yielded one hundred and thirteen bucks and nine doe deer, killed by thirty-three hunting parties and nine single hunters.

Seven hunting parties during the same time killed their allotment of six deer, among these being several local parties who are listed in this article. The data was obtained from Forester McKinney, who is not only an enthusiastic forester but a valuable friend of game so far as is his power to enforce the hunting laws, rules and regulations.

Other sections of the Seven Mountains, particularly that embracing the Bear Meadows, have also yielded large returns to hunters up to this time.

Half Day's Hunt—Two Bucks.

Saturday morning Lewis Garbrick and Paul Shreckengast, both of near Centre Hall, drove to the Seven Mountains in a Ford for a day's hunting. Just after the noon hour they drove to the front of the Reporter office with two spike bucks, one lying on each side of the car along the radiator and running board. The animals were quite large and were in good flesh. There were three bucks in the flock, and as there were but two hunters, one had to be left for another season. The killing was done in the vicinity of Potters Mills, the exact spot not being made clear.

The above article was written following a conversation with the young men, but the real circumstances surrounding the killing were not revealed until that evening when a resident of Centre Hall, who was on the scene, bubbled over with laughter on telling the story, which is this: Three bucks came out of the mountains into the village of Potters Mills, where two of them became fast in a woven wire fence. The third cleared the fence and continued on. William Garis, who was doing mason work nearby, saw the plight of the deer and going to the hotel found the two hunters referred to above, to whom he told his story. Shreckengast, in the excitement which prevailed, went to the place where the deer were struggling, forgetting to take his gun, and then returned to the hotel to procure it. Returning, he shot one of the bucks in the head, knocking off both horns. He then handed the gun to his companion, Garbrick, and he went a little further where the other buck was kicking furiously to extricate itself from the fence, and shot it.

A sight beautiful to the eyes of huntersmen was that which presented itself to the front of the camping quarters of a Reading party who are encamped in the Seven Mountains not far from Potters Mills, at what is known as Stave Field. On the last day of the season for hunting birds there were strung up twenty-two pheasants and thirty-four rabbits, the whole making a fine showing of small game. The following day the party directed their attention to hunting the larger game.

Guy Brooks, of near Centre Hall, went to the Tussey Mountain on Monday and shot a three-prong buck weighing 175 pounds. He dragged his quarry for over a mile and loaded it on his car.

Talk about illegal hunting! Nine doe deer were said to have been hanging at Bellefonte meat markets on Monday, shipped in from various parts of Centre county by the game wardens and consigned to the Bellefonte hospital.
