Charged With Breaking Health Laws.

An inspector of the State Health Department furnished evidence to Justice Keichline, in Bellefonte, of various violations of the health laws.
Allison Hollabaugh, of Coleville, who has been making his home at Boalsburg, was charged with entering the home of Clark Peters at Boalsburg on two occasions when it was placarded for scarlet fever. He was fined \$20 and costs.
Mrs. Martha Peters, of Coleville, was fined \$10 and costs for tearing from her door a placard quarantining the home for whooping cough.
Dr. W. S. Glenn, of State College, was charged with the failure to report several contagious diseases.
Dr. J. C. Rogers was held on two counts as the result of improperly reporting contagious diseases in Bellefonte. The cases of Dr. Rogers were reserved by the justice for further consideration.

Will Test Sanity.

Many suggestions as to methods of dealing with reckless automobile drivers have been made but the most unique comes from Mayor Shank, of Indianapolis, who announces that a sanity test will be given all persons arrested in that city for speeding.
The state law, he says, provides that persons held for sanity tests cannot give bond, therefore persons arrested and held for examination by a sanity commission would be forced to remain in jail until they were examined.
There is some question as to the sanity of a driver who recklessly speeds through city streets, and an examination of some of the speeders might reveal that they are unfit to operate motor vehicles.

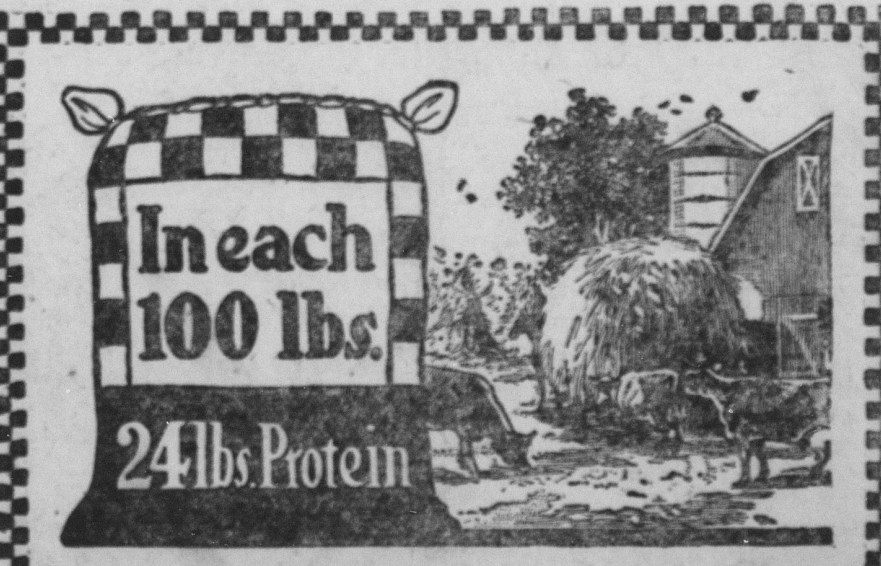

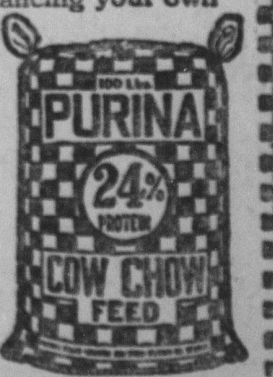
