**DRY BILL NOW LAW.**

The Pinchot "Dry" bill was passed by the house on Tuesday and became a law Tuesday night when the governor signed it. This bill does away with all licenses granted—the saloon is now abolished, according to the Pinchot idea.

Tom Beaver, Centre county's representative, as one of the 107 who voted for the bill. Senator Betts also voted for it when it passed the senate. The majority was just two above that required. The ballot was 107 for and 109 against.

**THE DEATH RECORD.**

MEYER.—Calvin Noah Meyer was born March 10, 1865, and died as the result of inflammatory rheumatism, Saturday evening, March 24, aged 58 years, 14 days. In the immediate family he is survived by his wife, Mary, Vianna (nee Stover) Meyer and one son, Lynn Vinton Meyer, who is a sophomore at Franklin and Marshall College. The following brothers and sisters also survive: William, of Loganton; Jacob and Philip, of Coburn, are half brothers; Cyrus, Thomas, Mrs. Lynn Korman, and Mrs. Laura Bartges, of Coburn. A daughter preceded him in death about eleven years ago. Funeral services Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock from the house and continued in the Reformed church at Coburn, of which Mr. Meyer was a faithful and active member, conducted by the pastor, Rev. John S. Hollenbach. Members of a S. S. class composed of young men, taught by Mr. Meyer, served in the capacity of pall bearers, an excellent sign of respect and appreciation for his leadership.

Mr. Meyer was engaged in the lumber business and was thus well known in his community. He was a member of the Coburn band, in which capacity he will be missed as well as in other ways. The bereaved household wish to thank relatives and friends for their assistance and sympathy during the illness and loss of husband and father.

LEE.—After suffering with that dread disease, cancer, for a period of two or more years, Miss Sadie Lee died at the home of her father, John R. Lee, at Spring Mills, Monday forenoon. She had been confined to bed but for about two weeks. Her age was 59 years, 8 months.

Miss Lee was a daughter of John R. and Mary (Bliner) Lee, and was born at Tusseyville. She is survived by her father, for whom she was the housekeeper, and one sister, Mrs. Philip Bradford, Lemont, and these brothers: Jacob C. Spring Mills; George, State College; Alfred, Boalsburg.

Although she and her father moved to Spring Mills several years ago, Miss Lee retained her membership in the Lutheran church at Tusseyville, where services will be held today (Thursday). Interment will be made in the Reformed and Lutheran cemetery, Rev. M. C. Drumm, to officiate.

McGARVEY.—The following is reprinted from the Phillipsburg Journal of Saturday:

Mrs. Mary Adams McGarvey, widow of Thomas McGarvey, and the mother of Mrs. (Rev.) W. R. Picken, of Centre Hall, formerly of Osceola Mills, and a relative of Rev. Father McGarvey, of this city, died at the old McGarvey farm home, now occupied by her son, William, at Aughwick Mills, near Mt. Union, on Wednesday night, March 21, aged 97 years, 7 months. She was probably Huntingdon county's oldest resident, and was born in Limerick, Ireland. Beside the daughter and son named, she leaves another son, Dr. John McGarvey, of Loraine, Ohio. She was the grandmother of Attorney W. D. Meals, of Cleveland, Ohio, who is a legal advisor of President Harding.

He was born in Penna Valley sixty-five years ago, and at one time lived in Bellefonte.
