Kreamer, whose death occurred in Centre Hall a few weeks ago, passed peacefully into the beyond at her home in Rebersburg on Friday morning, at the advanced age of 87 years, 6 months and 1 day. Her husband, who was John Wolfe, former commissioner of Centre county, preceded her in death twenty years ago. The deceased was a native of Rebersburg and was a consistent member of the Reformed church. She wielded an influence for good that was felt in her home community. Surviving her are five daughters, namely, Mrs. Jerome Meyer, Mrs. Luther Frank, Mrs. Anna Ziegler, Mrs. Ida Harter, all of Rebersburg; Mrs. E. W. Brungart, of Selinsgrove; also three sisters—Mrs. A. Luckenbach, Bellefonte; Mrs. D. J. Meyer, Centre Hall; Mrs. Jacob Kephart, Rebersburg.

Funeral services were held Monday morning by Rev. W. A. McClellan, interment being made in the Rebersburg cemetery.

SMITH.—Leroy Smith, the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Smith, of Reedsville, was called to rest Sunday afternoon. The child was aged twenty-one months. Death was due to pneumonia. The body of the little one was brought to the home of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Michael Smith, at Potters Mills, from which place the funeral was held Wednesday. Interment in the Sprucetown cemetery.

WILLIAMS.—Mrs. Jane Curtin Williams, widow of Mark G. Williams, of Martha Furnace, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Jesse H. Ridge, in Lock Haven, after a lingering illness due to infirmities of age. Deceased was born at Yarnell and was 94 years of age last December. She united with the Milesburg Baptist church 73 years ago and throughout her long life won by her beautiful character the love of all who knew her. Besides her daughter she is survived by a son, David Williams, of Sykesville; a step-daughter, Mrs. Mary Adams, of Crescent, Okla.; a brother, David Heaton, of Martha Furnace, and two sisters, Mrs. Poorman, of Coalville, and Mrs. Belle Robb, of Avis.

WOODLING.—Christopher Woodling, a former resident of Millheim, died at the home of his daughter, at Lewisburg, aged 86 years, 2 months and 11 days. He suffered a paralytic stroke about two weeks ago, which was the cause of his death.

Mr. Woodling was born near Freeburg, but much of his life was spent in Centre county and he resided in Millheim for many years. He left there about fourteen years ago, when he moved to Millheim, later moving to Lewisburg.

His wife, who was Rebecca Malze, died about twelve years ago.

He is survived by one son, John A. of Parkersburg, W. Va., one daughter, Mrs. Annie Confer, of Lewisburg, seven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. Interment was made in Millheim.

MILLER.—Mrs. Mary A. Miller, widow of the late John Adam Miller, died at the Dr. G. S. Frank home, in Millheim, at the advanced age of 85 years, 11 months and 13 days. She had been exceedingly active until some weeks ago when she began to weaken, suffering no pains, and passed peacefully away at the time stated.

She was born in Miles township, April 23, 1837, a daughter of Frederick and Catharine Esterline. Her husband preceded her to the grave May 14, 1909. She is survived by three children, Mrs. G. S. Frank, of Millheim; Miss Adella Catharine, of Harrisburg, and Dr. E. M. Miller, of Beavertown.

Took Option on Farm.

The Pittsburgh Lime and Stone Company, a subsidiary of the U. S. Steel Company, took a six-months option on the Miss Mary Fisher farm, at Penn Hall. The farm contains one hundred fifty acres and is highly productive. The holders of the option are after lime stone of a grade that can be used in the production of steel and iron. The same parties have already purchased the Ralph Shook farm and the John Bair farm, in the same section, and have made overtures to the Allison heirs for the Allison farm, also lying in the same vicinity.

A bit of history connected with the Fisher farm is of local interest. This farm was purchased September, 1864, by Major J. B. Fisher from George Musser, who inherited it from his father, Jonas Musser. It was a well and popularly known hotel stand and called the Washington house. The property consisted of the hotel, a brick building, a large barn, and the brick house adjoining. This latter house was erected by George Musser and was occupied by the farmer while the hotel was passing through its flourishing period.

When Major Fisher came into possession of the place, Manassas Guise was landlord there. In 1876, William Wolfe moved onto the place. Major Fisher was averse to the place continuing as a licensed house and concluded that it should be conducted without dispensing liquor, and accordingly leased the place on this basis. This move on the part of the Major was very distasteful to many who daily frequented the hotel to quench their thirst, and he was warned that reprisals would be inaugurated.

The Fisher store stand was just across the way, and it was predicted that if the Major quit the sale of old rye his mercantile business would go smash or want of patronage. The hotel was shorn of its drinking counter, but the Fisher stand went on most successfully. There was one surprise furnished Mr. Fisher. To the front of the hotel was a large wooden swinging sign bearing the name "Washington House." The sign was supported by two heavy posts, which one might were cut down, because, as was intimated later, "no red eye, no hotel sign."

After Mr. Wolf vacated the place the farm was leased to Franklin Hosterman, father of Prof. W. P. Hosterman, of Penn Hall, who remained there thirteen years.
