8000 ELKS MARCH IN PARADE.

Grand Lodge Meets in Atlanta—Memorial Headquarters Building in Chicago to Cost Three Million Dollars.

Elks literally overran Atlanta on the occasion of their grand annual parade, the closing event of their 1923 grand lodge convention and the reunion, and thousands of members of the order, with their two score bands, drum corps and other musical units, picturesque floats and handsome uniforms of purple and white received resounding ovations as they marched through the heart of the city.

Charles H. Grakelov of Philadelphia, esteemed grand esquire of the order, had charge of the marchers. Approximately 8,000 persons were in line.

Prominent among the floats was the Pennsylvania state association exhibit, depicting the signing of the treaty with the Indians by Penn. The Philadelphia lodge No. 2, which has been conspicuous throughout the reunions with its large attendance and varied units, had three floats.

Headed by the local American Legion band, the first division included principally Atlanta lodge, 78 with nearly 4,000 men in line. They were followed by the second division, headed by the Philadelphians, 600 strong, with their mounted, uniformed patrol, armed patrol and drill team.

New York No. 1, Chicago No. 4, Brooklyn No. 22, Baltimore, Boston, Buffalo, Rochester, and Detroit were among the other large cities represented in this section.

With the approval of the grand lodge contracts for the construction of the proposed memorial headquarters building in Chicago will be let within the next few weeks, according to the report of the commission in charge of the grand lodge meeting. The building will cost \$3,000,000 and work is expected to be started this year, the report said.

John K. Tener, former governor of Pennsylvania, and past grand exalted ruler of the Elks, made the report on the proposed memorial headquarters.
