Improved Disinfectant Sosp.

Austria reports a new development in the manufacture of disinfectant soaps, which it is claimed has proved a decided success. The disinfectant used is lactate of silver and a very small amount produces remarkable resuits. The seap has been used in hospitals for general washing purposes, for sterilizing instruments (! does not contain any corrosive in gredients and hence can be safely used for this purpose), disinfecting clothes, rubber gloves, etc. There are several uses for the new soap in cosmetics. The soap is made by dissolving one part of the silver lactate in fifteen parts of water and then adding enough agaragar, or carrageon moss. to make a jelly. The mixture is then added to the regular soap batch, and the resulting product can be made nto solid, paste or liquid. In the solid form it can be used for tollet or laundry purposes. In the paste form It is usable as a destifrice. In liquid form it way be used as a gargle and month wash,-Exchange
