

Schools Open.

The borough schools opened on Monday, with the following enrollment: High school, 61; grammar school, 46; intermediate, 52; primary, 30.

The four-year high school, with three teachers—Messrs. Fuhrman and Heckman, and Miss Sara Neff has been inaugurated, and in order to accommodate the work of the enlarged school it became necessary to remove another school from the main building. The intermediate grade has been placed in the room to the rear of the Methodist church, formerly occupied by Miss Helen Bartholomew's primary school, while the primary school is temporarily housed in the Sunday school room of the Evangelical church.

This makeshift arrangement is the best that can be done under the circumstances, and the building of a new school plant is a matter which can be delayed but a little while longer. The crowded condition of all four schools has from time to time been severely criticised by the state department of education, and it is true that schools of fifty scholars are too large for efficient work.

The citizens of Centre Hall should become tuned up for a new school building, and give the school board every encouragement. They are only public servants and working in the interest of all—especially the children of school age.

Plan Auto Tour to Dairy Show.
