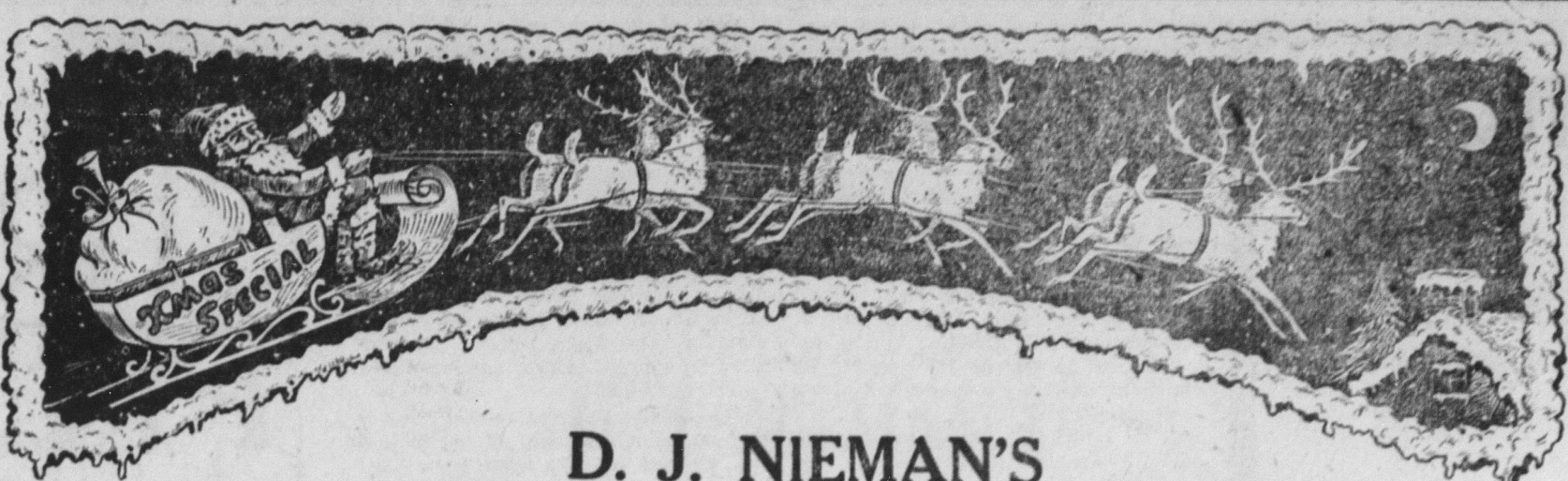

T. M. Gramley and daughter, Miss Orpha, returned from Ohio on Saturday.

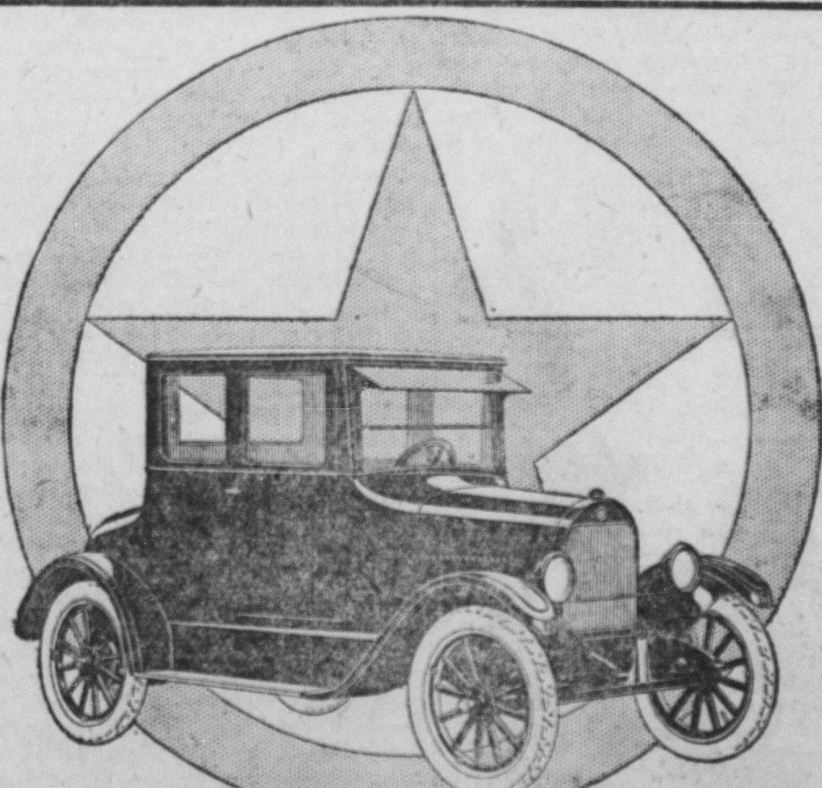
