**Secretaries Must Be Insured.**

Organizations whose officers or other employees receive pay for their services must be insured under the State Workmen's Insurance Fund.

Employers are responsible to their employees for any injury which might befall the employed in the course of their employment. Moreover, the injury does not have to be caused while at work, but is compensable if it occurs on the street or any place where the duties may call the employee of any lodge or society, the notice from the Workmen's Insurance Fund to local organizations point out.

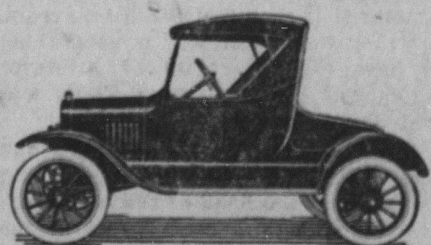

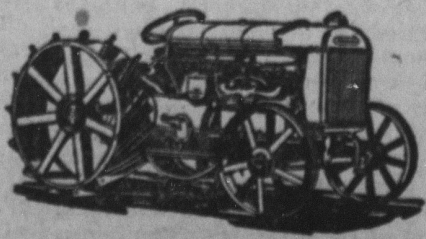

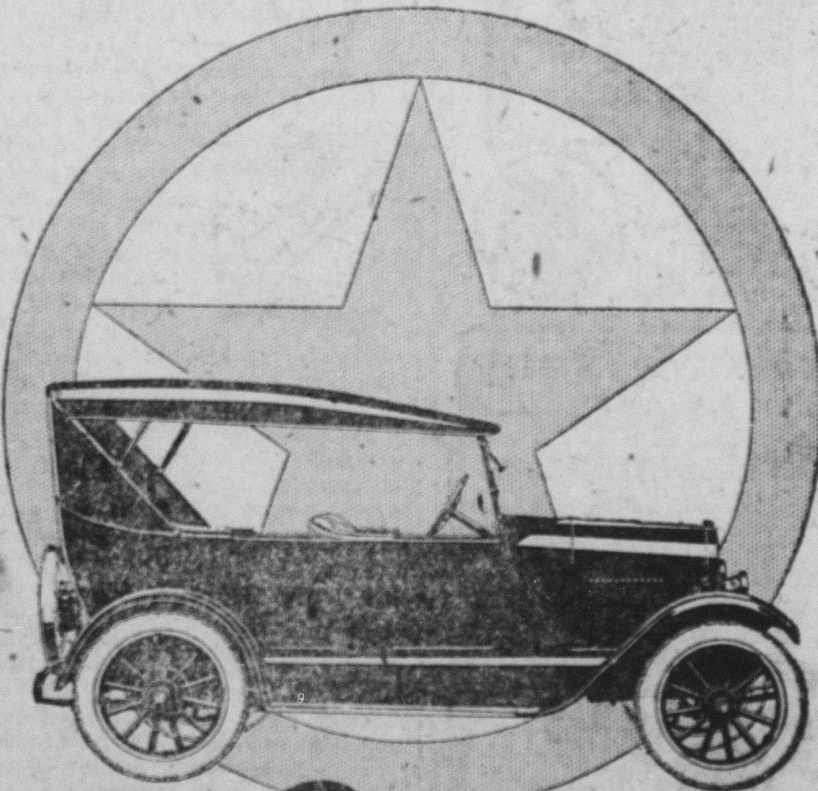
